

Next up was the introduction of the Alpine and Lakeside Princesses who as part of their service to the community bused tables and made sure the guests were taken care of. Joel Anderson, California Assemblyman of the 77th District took the podium to present Dan and the committee a special recognition. "I couldn't be more honored to have a memorial to the men who gave us our freedom, and am proud to present this proclamation for this special honor," Anderson

Charlie Brown, Director of Viejas Community Relations, addressed the Tribe's financial investment in the wall. "We are pleased to be involved in the Wall of Honor and to do something special for those who gave us the freedom we have today," he said.

Herb Cawthorne, the M.C. for the event, and a member of the Wall Committee, introduced Foster. "He is kind, patient, and ready to go," Cawthorne said.

"He's the perfect person to carry this banner. He is us!"

Foster thanked everyone for attending and all the community businesses and people for taking the dream to the next level. He then put on his original uniform jacket from when he served in the Army in Vietnam. Pulling out his final paycheck stub still in a pocket and announcing it was for \$82.82, brought a warm laugh from the crowd.

'The reason for building this Wall varies," Foster said. "The WWII Veterans are leaving us at alarming rates. We wanted to say thank you to our veterans and also have something so that our youth can look at the wall years from now and say that was my father, grandfather or mother who fought for this country."

Among the youth attending the event, Junior Miss Alpine Alyia Bram read a commentary about why the Wall is important to her age group. People's

Choice of Alpine Gracie Jordan read a comment about her family's Veterans including one who fought in the Battle of Mogadishu.

Wall Committee member Larry Curtis introduced a special guest, 90-year old Colonel Phillip Morell, who showed up in his USMC blues. He was a local teacher for many years including the principal at Granite Hills High School in 1960. A letter was read from the Commandant of the Marine Corp. about Morell. Oscar Knight of the Alpine Kiwanis and recently elected Kiwanis International Trustee, said, "This Wall is not only important to the freedom we enjoy everyday, but in ways we will never know.'

Dan Parent of SDG&E spoke about his company's contribution to the Wall, and Rear Admiral Steele remarked how those whose names are on the wall will feel even better about serving their country.

The WWII Veterans attending the event were seated at a special table in the room. Wall Committee member Bob Jackson introduced the men, told a little about their service and presented them with a special cap the Kiwanians ordered for them. I'm proud to say one of them was my 85-year-old father, USMC WWII Veteran Floyd W. Nicholson.

During the event guests enjoyed a great video created by Carol Lewis of local service members who served along with trivia about the wars. The crowd then moved outdoors where Foster invited every veteran there to overturn one scoop of dirt where the Wall will be constructed. Everyone then made their way to Alpine Community Park to listen to the inspiring Marine Corp

# A very successful DUI/Drivers checkpoint

The El Cajon Police Department held a DUI/Drivers License checkpoint on Friday, July 30, 7 p.m. to 2 a.m. Saturday, July 31. Statistics show 1,766 vehicles passed through the checkpoint, 1,059 vehicles were stopped. El Cajon Police arrested three drivers for driving under the influence, four other drivers were arrested on other charges, 39 vehicles were impounded. This and other checkpoints are held in an effort to reduce the number of persons killed and injured in alcohol involved crashes. DUI checkpoints are conducted to identify offenders and get them off the street, as well as educate the public on the dangers of impaired driving. The public is encouraged to help keep roadways safe by calling 911 if they see a suspected impaired driver. Funding for this operation is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

# Wildfires

There has been a series of recent wildfires in Lakeside, most recently on July 29, near I-8 and Los Coches Rd. It was quickly extinguished by fire crews. The vegetation fire caused no injuries or structure damage. "Thanks to an aggressive initial attack the vegetation fire was quickly under control," said Greg Schreiner, Division Chief Lakeside Fire Protection Department.

Fire investigators from Cal Fire, the Lakeside Fire Protection District and United States Fish and Wild Life Service along with law enforcement officers from the San Diego Sheriff's Department and California Highway Patrol worked together collecting evidence and conducting interviews which led to the arrest the following morning of a suspect. He was placed under arrest and booked in county jail.

Andy Parr, Fire Chief of the Lakeside Fire Protection District said, "This was truly a collaborative effort of Fire and Law Enforcement agencies that led to the arrest of this suspect, and I am very proud of all the personnel from these agencies and their cooperative work on this case.

# Roll out the 'Cash Cube' to raise money for local charities

iejas Casino and Fox 5 San Diego rolled out the Viejas Cash Cube today to help raise money for San Diego area charities. Today's event kicked off the month-long Cool Cash promotion at Viejas Casino, where over \$1,000,000 is up for grabs in August.

Recently on the "Fox 5 Morning News" program, me-

teorologist Chrissy Russo and news anchors Shally Zomorodi and Paul Bloom each had an opportunity to enter the Viejas Cash Cube to raise money for their chosen charities – the San Diego chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF), the local USO and the local Armed Forces YMCA. The Cash Cube was loaded with \$100 bills and each person had 30 seconds to grab as

many \$100 bills as possible as the money blew around the Cash Cube for 30 seconds.



# Whooping Cough epidemic grows

alifornia's epidemic of pertussis (whooping cough) shows no signs of slowing, Dr. Mark Horton, director of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), warned today. As of July 27, the number of illnesses from the disease this year had climbed to 2,174, a six-fold increase from the 349 illnesses reported for the same period last year. In addition, a San Diego County infant has become the seventh to die from pertussis this year.

"The pertussis epidemic is a sobering and tragic reminder

that diseases long thought controlled can return with a vengeance," Horton said. "We can protect ourselves and the most vulnerable in our community by getting vaccinated today."

California is on pace to have the most cases of pertussis reported in more than half a century. Infants are having the highest rates at 1.1 case for every 1,000 infants.

"Because immunity from pertussis vaccine or disease wears off, Californians—especially family members and caregivers of infants—should make sure they get their shots," Horton said.

In addition to the typical series of five childhood pertussis immunizations, CDPH recommends an adolescent-adult pertussis booster vaccine (Tdap) for everyone 10 years or older who has not yet received it, especially:

- Women of childbearing age, before, during, or immediately after pregnancy, and
- Other people, including household contacts, caregivers, and health care workers, who have contact with pregnant women or infants.

Children 7-9 years of age who did not receive all of their routine childhood shots are recommended to receive a Tdap booster dose.

The pertussis vaccination series can begin when an infant is 6 weeks of age. Infants, however, are not adequately protected until they received their first three shots by age 6 months. The series of shots that most children receive wears off by the time they reach middle school.

For new mothers and anyone with close contact with infants, CDPH is providing Tdap vaccine at birthing hospitals, community health centers, Native American health centers and local health departments.

A typical case of pertussis in children and adults starts with a cough and runny nose for one-to-two weeks, followed by weeks to months of rapid coughing fits that sometimes ends with a whooping sound. Fever is rare.

The diagnosis of pertussis is often delayed in young infants, whose are less likely to have a notable cough – caregivers and health care providers should consider the possibility of pertussis in infants with coughs or colds to help in prompt diagnosis and treatment.

# Summer Cultural Program at Viejas brings children closer to their roots

entle winds blow down from Viejas mountain stirring papers the children are working on in the cultural park to scatter like a bird leaving feathers in a trail to discoveries. Today is nearing the end of Viejas' two-week annual Summer Cultural Program. A 15 year tradition at Viejas, this year the program is run by Ral Christman, son of Viejas Tribal Councilmember, Virginia Christman.

The program focuses on two aspects of cultural learning – hunting and fishing and cooking for older kids, and for them and the younger children, learning the Kumeyaay language. Ral, a ninth and tenth grade history and geography teacher at Granite Hills, begins the program everyday with a blessing. Then the lesson of the day includes the topics of respect, history, language, purification and cooking. The 45 - 50 students who attend are divided into three groups.

"I created a curriculum of words that's different for the three age groups," Ral said. "We have a pre-school and we help them learn 25 words of our language. These kids (present in the Cultural Park) have learned 45 words and the older ones learn more language."

The program has a definite focus on language because it's been disappearing over the years. "There was an era when our language was left in the hands of the elders, and as they continue to get older or decease, our language has suffered," Ral said. "So we're in the midst of bringing it back."

Kids surround the tables covered with worksheets and each child works on learning the language in a different way. Isabella is an adorable child with short pig tails sprouting from the top of her head. She has a pair of sissors in hand, ready to cut out pictures labeled in Kumeyaay language. Wideeyed and happy-faced Hunter takes extra care in coloring the picture of a Kumeyaay family. "I like to come here; it's fun."

There's also a story created by Virginia that the kids can read with words from their native language in it, or a word search. A short distance away the teacher loudly asks, "Who knows how to say bathroom?" Who knows how to say water?" If one child is too busy with his handiwork, another answers.

"Our focus for the program is to have a traditional platform," Ral said. "It's our goal that our kids will be brought back to understating our language and even be conversational with it during the program."

The helpers, counselors and teachers working with the children are their mothers or other relatives who took training classes in order to teach the children. Danessa Hastings volunteers because her children Isabella and Hunter are attending the class. "I'm happy that my kids can learn our culture," Hastings said. "I think it's important for the kids to learn our language, and they are already using some of the words at home. And it's also something we are learning together."

Over in the recreation hall Stan and Martha Rodriquez work with the kids from seven or eight through high school in learning the language. Originally from the Santa Ysabel reservation, Virginia said it was important to have someone from the tribe but in a different area that spoke the native language. Kids of all ages bounce around the room, some following Stan's directions and others gliding over to a board with words where Martha awaits them

"The best way to teach a language is by immersion in small groups," Stan said. "We take them out of their comfort zone, but find something they're interested in and make it fun. Soon it becomes instinctive. We encourage them to use the language all the time instead of English."

The last teaching area is just across the entrance to the Recreation hall in the kitchen. Rebecca Cuero and helper Mackenzie Espinoza are surrounded by massive bags of flour and pots big enough to, well – feed a small contingent of tribal students. A large pot of beans cooks on the back burner. Warm enticing smells begin to waft through the air.

"My job today is teach the girls how to make fry bread."

Cuero said. "I married into the tribe and learned from other elders how to prepare this recipe. Fry bread is not really a traditional food of the Kumeyaay but at one point in their history when they were taken over by the Spaniards, they were given flour, lard and salt and out of that came fru bread. Traditionally they would have eaten things like squirrel, deer. yucca and the acorn. Today the students in the program are going to enjoy a lunch of beans, hamburger and fry bread."

Ral certainly proves the apple doesn't fall far from the tree. His mother is a keeper of tribal traditions and a spiritual and prayer leader. She, her husband, Ron, and family continue to practice purifications, fasts and sweats and follow their traditional heritage. Ral has taken the teachings of his

mother and elders to heart in his passion to educate the Viejas children about their culture. He has five children

of his own and knows the importance of his efforts. To further prepare for this program, he earned a masters degree in education and made friends with language educators to help take on that

responsibility.

His mother is not only proud of her son, but happy with the results of the program. "We have a one day a month

cultural day, but this program is important to continue every year," Virginia said. "I'd like to bring teachers from other tribes here to introduce their cultures as well. It's been wonderful to see the kids singing and

dancing and having fun while learning our culture."

"I'm fortunate that being raised culturally by my mother so I can blend that culture with my education and help the

children remain part of our community," Ral said. "It's important to know our old ways but to also embrace the new. We're in the midst of getting some of our cultural songs on iPod. Our songs are ones of celebrations, and we should have them to enjoy."

Happy faces from the children in these groups clearly indicate they are indeed learning about their culture and enjoy spending time with such passionate and learned elders.

The firm's CEO Lance Fender (Bruce Greenwood) is impressed with Tim's idea, but in order for him to get his promotion, he needs to bring a first place schmuck to an annual dinner party the executives hold in order to make fun of them.

A subplot of the movie involves Tim's girlfriend Julie and her narcissistic art client Kieran Vollard (Jemaine Clement). Kieran is an eccentric artist who only paints pictures of himself in strange related settings. Kieran is there to fill in the laughs where Berry can't and to me, it wasn't really all that funny. Darla (Lucy Punch) is a crazy one-night stand Tim had before meeting Julie, and was one of the few characters that got a small number of chuckles out of me. Zach Galifianakis (The Hangover) as Therman does not add much to the humor as Berry's boss who has proclaimed ability of mind control.

The title of the movie is a little misleading since the dinner scene is only present in the last quarter of the movie. The movie should be called, "The Two Days That Lead up to the Dinner for Schmucks," but that would not look very good on



# Avoid common kitten catastrophes and puppy pitfalls

ew puppies and kittens have endless amounts of energy and curiosity. With all that playing, running, jumping and sniffing around, these furry additions to the family may need some protection against serious accidents.

Robert Coe and his wife Sandra of Santee, Calif., know this all too well. The couple thought they had seen the last of the bees buzzing around their home after exterminators sprayed a hive in their yard. That is, until later that night, when Sandra noticed that the

family's 1-year-old Labrador retriever wasn't acting like herself.

"My wife saw Ellie throw up several times," said Robert. "There were hundreds of dead bees in each pile."

Unbeknownst to the Coes, Ellie had discovered and eaten the beehive after the exterminators had left. Frightened by the volume of dead bees that Ellie was vomiting, Sandra decided the dog needed to go to the veterinary hospital.

The emergency veterinarian

on duty examined Ellie and determined she had most likely only ingested dead bees and hadn't been stung. Additionally, Poison Control indicated the pesticide did not pose a significant risk of toxicity. After a dose of anti-nausea medication and a few hours of observation, Ellie was on her way back home.

While most young dogs probably won't get hold of an entire beehive, there's nothing unusual about puppies or kittens eating things they shouldn't or running into potentially harmful insects.

Veterinary Pet Insurance Co. (VPI), the nation's oldest and largest provider of pet health insurance, recently looked at its database of more than 480,000 insured pets to find the top 10 accidental injuries suffered by dogs and cats during the first two years of their lives.

"Pet owners falsely assume that they don't need pet insurance because their pet is young and healthy," said Dr. Carol McConnell, vice president and chief veterinary medical officer for VPI. "While younger pets are less susceptible to serious illnesses such as cancer, our data shows that pets of all ages can suffer costly accidental injuries. Pet insurance is designed to defray unexpected treatment costs--whenever they may oc-

cur. It's important for owners of puppies and kittens to keep in mind that just because their pets may be young, they're not indestructible."

In addition to the physical toll the above accidents can take on young dogs and cats, the financial costs can be draining. The top 10 puppy and kitten accidents cost VPI policyholders a combined \$1.5 million and \$91,371, respectively, in the past year.

There are several steps that owners can take to "babyproof" their homes. Examples include clearing obstacles inside and out that an uncoordinated younger pet might collide with during playtime, removing items that can be



mistaken for food from the floor and countertops, and keeping all medications tightly sealed and securely stored in drawers or medicine cabinets.



### FAQ's

"How often should I pump my tank?"

"What if some of my family members are children?"

"What if we both work?"

"Who should I call?" Septic Tank Service Intervals

The amount of time between septic pumping varies with tank size and occupancy of your home. Typically a 1000 gallon tank should be serviced every 10 person years, a 1200 gallon every 12 person years, a 1500 gallon, every 15 person years. For example a 1200 gallon tank with 3 people in the home should be serviced every 4 years and with 6 people every 2 years. If you have children, they count as persons (look at your grocery bill). If you both work, we count that as "normal people". If the formula loses you just pump your tank every 3 years or call us.

# Ryan Mathews inks a 'Blue and Gold' contract

he San Diego Chargers got better and faster Sunday when their first round draft pick running back Ryan Mathews signed a five-year contract that could be worth an estimated \$25.65 million.

"We are excited to have Ryan here and ready to go," said Chargers President Dean Spanos. Aside from his outstanding talents on the field, he's a class young man and the kind of player we're proud to add to our team."

Known for his power and downhill running, the 6-0, 218 pound speedy Mathews in his junior year led the NCAA with 1,808 yards and 19 touchdowns (a school record). Against some of the nations best defenses Mathews gained 20 yards or more 17 times, and against Boise State had a field day with a 234-yard, three touchdown effort, averaging a huge 12.3 yards per carry.

In three seasons with the Bulldogs Mathews rushed for 3,280 yards averaging 6.1 yards per carry, while scoring 39 touchdowns (another school record). He was the only

player in 2009 to have 100yard rushing games against Top 25 teams (Cincinnati No. 5, Boise State No. 6, and Wisconsin No. 14).

Chargers Head Coach Norv Turner happy to see his number one running back in training camp said. "You're going to see more and more of Ryan. He has great speed, great vision and obviously the physical skills."

The 12'th overall pick in this years NFL draft, Ryan Mathews is expected to fill the departed shoes of future Hall-of-Fame running back LaDainian Tomlinson, a favorite among San Diego Charger fans.

"I think my agent and the organization did a good job to get everything settled," said the rookie running back. "I'm just really glad to be here."

"Home is just right up the road," said Mathews. "It's great. I have a lot of support in California, in Bakersfield and Fresno. It's really a dream come true."

Mathews first practiced with the Chargers Sunday afternoon much to the delight of the fans in attendance at Chargers Park.

# 2010 Hyundai Blue Elantra has come a long way

oy has Hyundai come a long way. Today they are one of the best compact vehicles on the road and other manufacturers use Hyundai as their yard stick. Back in 1986 this would have never been the case, but Hyundai listened to their dealers and gave them a car they could be proud of to drive. Today's tester is a 2010 Elantra with a manual transmission and an upgraded sound system. The base car will give you almost everything you would want in

a commuter car, first car or a car for college.

JD Powers ranked the Hyundai Elantra "Highest Ranked Compact Car in Initial Quality" in 2009. That is quit an achievement, so let's look at the Elantra. My tester came in a Carbon Gray Mist color, gray interior and not a lot of frills. This car is made for work. but it comes very well equipped, starting with a 2.0liter 138 horsepower 16-valve Dual Overhead Camshaft 4-cylinder engine with CVVT (Constant Variable Valve Timing) that runs on regular and gets 26 miles per gallon in the city and 35 on the open road.

Here is what Hyundai is famous for, 5-year 60,000 mile New Car Warranty, 10-year 100,000 mile Powertrain Warranty, 7-year Unlimited-mile Anti-Perforation Warranty, and a 5-year unlimited Roadside Assistance Program. Compare that to the competition before you buy!

My tester came with a very efficient 5-speed manual transmission with EcoShift indicator that tells you when to shift to get the maximum fuel efficiency, pretty cool, but I just ignored it since I wasn't looking for fuel economy! The Elantra also came with power rack and pinion steering, 15-inch steel wheels with full hub caps, front independent suspension with McPherson struts. In the rear you have independent Multi-Link suspension which gives you a great ride and cornering.

Moving inside you will find comfort features like a good

sound system with 4 speakers, but this car was up graded to the AM/FM/XM/CD/MP3 audio system with 6 speakers, 2 more than the base system IPod/USB and MP3 auxiliary ports at the bottom of the dash with in reach of the driver and passenger. You also get power windows and door locks, tilt steering wheel, remote keyless entry with an alarm, heated outside mirrors, digital clock, front cup and bottle holders, 6-way adjustable driver seat done manually, center console with storage and a armrest, front seat back pockets, 60/40 split rear seat backs for added storage, and map lights. When you buy a new Hyundai they will give you a full tank of gas.

Safety in a Hyundai has always been the most important feature. Hyundai has to offer as standard equipment, Dual Front Air Bags, Dual Front Seat Mounted Side Air Bags, Roof Mounted Side Air Bags, ABS Braking, Four Wheel Disc Brakes, Tire Pressure Monitoring System, Active Front Headrests and front seat belt pretensioners, plus

crumple zones surrounding the occupants.

Would I put this Elantra in my garage? Yes I would, if I commuted every day this would be a perfect vehicle or if I had a kid going to college this car is

perfect. Everything is covered under warranty for at least 5-year 60,000 miles and if your kid can't graduate in 5 years then her or she should pick up the maintenance costs! Stop by your local Hyundai dealer and check out the Elantra!
