eadquartered in Salt Lake City, Utah, Primary Residential Mortgage, Inc. is a national, independent, full-service, residential mortgage banker in business since 1998. As a direct lender it's their knowledgeable staff that controls the loan from start to finish. The company's mission is; "to be a nationally respected, locally known home loan company whose purpose is to finance your homeownership goals through a positive and personal experience.'

Chris Wiley has 22 years of experience in the mortgage business. He wanted to work in a small town and close to home where he knows the people they would work with and they might know him. He became the Branch Manager of Primary Residential Mortgage, Inc. in 2004. He's chosen a staff he can trust and who are knowledgeable about the loan process and know the community.

We're not a mortgage banker or a broker," he said. "Brokers shop for the best deals, but the best deals are on Wall Street and the closest you can get to Wall Street is a mortgage banker. Brokers look for the best deal for them not the best deal or rate for the customer. They were about 70 or 80 percent of the market during the heyday when it all fell apart. Now they're less than five percent so there's been restrictions and regulations they can't enforce or put into place.

Wiley said consumers need to be aware of the lenders that don't keep up with regulations or follow the rules and be aware of what those regulations are.

"But even though a company meets all the regulations it doesn't mean they can't cheat their customers. You can't regulate morality and a broker that's not licensed – and there are some – will never get audited because they're not licensed. Primary Mortgage sometimes gets clients that went to a broker that couldn't come through on their loan or re-fi."

Primary Residential Mortgage has been around since 1998 and is privately owned and has no debt. They handle purchases and some re-finance transactions. Their biggest purchase transactions are FHA, VA and USDA clients. They do only one to four bedroom units and realize a home is a client's largest and most complex financial investment, and they strive to provide clarity and ease to the home loan process.

"We do only the financing and clients can get preapproved first to see which program best suits them," Wiley said. "Then they know what they can spend and when they find a property they come back to us and everything is ready to go."

Centennial Moment: New Police and Fire Buildings

Below is an excerpt from a brochure published in 1961 in honor of the City's 50th anniversary of incorporation: "50 Years of Progress." The brochure chronicles events in the City by each year, from incorporation in 1912, through present day, at that time, in 1961. This Centennial moment focuses specifically on the year 1945

A new modern building was erected at the corner of East Douglas Avenue and Highland Avenue for the housing of the City Police and Fire Departments at a cost of \$74,824.

Representative of Lemon Grove visited the City and started a study of the El Cajon City Government to better understand the problems of the community and prepare themselves for incorporation.

The El Cajon Post Office

moved from its location on Main Street to a new building on the corner of Douglas Street and Magnolia Avenue. In July, Postmaster Jackson Roether announced that his office had been adjudged a first class office.

From a census taken by City officials toward the end of the year it was learned that better than 1,000 new homes had been constructed within the City limits. The El Cajon Theater, located across the street from the new post office, was burned down. Mr. G. Gallagher, the owner, announced that a new theater would be built on West Main Street. It will cost \$100,000. In the meantime the location of the old theater was to be used as an open air theater. G. Gallagher, the theater man, donated \$300 to the Volunteer Fireman's building fund for their efforts at the burning of his theater. business growth in the region. Grossmont, Cuyamaca colleges' summer class offerings up sharply

for summer session classes at Grossmont and Cuyamaca colleges have more than three times the number of sections to choose from compared to last year, thanks to voters who passed a statewide tax measure last fall increasing education funding.

With more than 250 sections to select from at the two East County colleges compared to just 74 last summer, students will have greater certainty of getting the classes they need to graduate, transfer to a university or to make career advances. However, the fuller summer schedule is still a long way from the college district's offerings of nearly 700 summer course sections in 2008, before state budget cuts whittled down the summer program.

"This is the best we've seen in four years, when the state budget crunch really started hammering us," Governing Board President Bill Garrett said. "We still are far short of where we were at our peak in 2008, but this summer, we're opening our doors wide. We're excited to welcome back those students who have been turned away because of a shortage of classes." Registration begins April 29 for the six- and eight-week classes starting June 10.

November's passage of the statewide tax measure, Proposition 30, prevented further catastrophic budget cuts to education and allowed the colleges to increase their course offerings. Between 2008 and 2012, state funding to the Grossmont-Cuyamaca Community College District was slashed by \$16 million, requiring the two colleges to eliminate 1.600 classes. Thousands of students were placed on waiting lists and unable to obtain the courses they needed for their education.

Robust summer schedules

Summer classes are a great way for students to enroll in hard-to-get prerequisite classes like Principles of Biology or Intermediate Algebra or those quick to fill in the fall, including Astronomy. Many students also appreciate the luxury of focusing on one course, instead of several courses during a semester.

Both colleges are offering several sections of general education classes in history, biology, chemistry, sociology, math, music and psychology. Grossmont College is also offering a wide range of specialized classes: administration of justice courses in criminal law; a culinary arts class in pastry skills in chocolate preparation, a business office technology course in effective job searching; and a selection of health professions classes, including those in nursing, occupational therapy assistant, orthopedic technology and cardiovascular technology.

At Cuyamaca College, students can enroll in careertechnical education classes in automotive technology, computer and information science, environmental health

IRS warns donors about charity scams following recent tragedies in Boston and Texas

It's sad but true. Following major disasters and tragedies, scam artists impersonate charities to steal money or get private information from well-intentioned taxpayers. Fraudulent schemes involve solicitations by phone, social media, email or in-person.

Scam artists use a variety of tactics. Some operate bogus charities that contact people by telephone to solicit money or financial information. Others use emails to steer people to bogus websites to solicit funds. allegedly for the benefit of tragedy victims. The fraudulent websites often mimic the sites of legitimate charities or use names similar to legitimate charities. Oh for a memory like dear old mom's

n growing up one of the outstanding things in my relationship with my mother had to do with her memory. She could remember everything.

All I had to do was ask dear old mom and she knew the answer. She knew everything. No matter the topic, she had an opinion about it, which truly amazed me as a young person.

"Oscar saw a need at the hospital and with the help of these four men's club's the fundraising was set in place," Peterson said.

After the East County fires in the early 2000's Knight realized that the most asked for item by those who lost their homes were for shoes. The Alpine Kiwanis kicked in \$8,000 to help those in need, all carried out by Knight.

"He was such a dedicated person that even when he got pneumonia one time, the only way his wife Gladys could make him rest was to put him on a cruise ship," Jackson said. "Oscar had a broad vision and the attitude of, 'this needs to get done, so let's do it."

Interim Senior VP and Executive Director of the Rady Children's Foundation expressed gratitude to all the Kiwanians for their generous support of the hospital and the Miracle Mile of Quarters.

Gladys Knight thanked everyone who attended the ceremony and for their concern and support since his passing in 2012. "Thank all of you for coming today," she said. Kiwanis is truly a family. Knight was elected to a threevear term as a Kiwanis International Trustee in June 2010. at the 95th Annual Kiwanis International Convention in Las Vegas. A mortgage banker, Knight held a degree in business administration from Central State University, Wilberforce, Ohio, and a master's degree in finance from National University, San Diego. He was active in his community, volunteering for the American Red Cross, San Diego County YMCA, Grossmont College Foundation, and the Girl Scouts of America.

A life member with 28 years of perfect attendance, Knightalso was a former member of the San Diego Kiwanis Club and a charter member of the Division 100 Miracle Mile of Quarters Club.

AT THE MOVIES

'Gatsby' has highs and lows

y how time changes things. That was my first impression of director, producer, co-writer Baz Luhrmann's The Great Gatsby. That was the result of watching the first 25 minutes of the new movie and sitting through an extravagant scene of a party at Jay Gatsby's (Leonardo DiCaprio) pretentious mansion. The volume of the film shot up to "Rolling Stones concert level." I had to hold my ears closed several times.

The guests at the party were exquisitely dressed like the 1920s - the era in which EScott Fitzgerald wrote the famous book. However, they were dancing styles of today - jumping up and down (almost gangman style) and for a short while to hip hop music. Add in the special ridiculous 3-D glasses they passed out because Luhrmann wanted to, "heighten the dramatic and visual sense of what we were trying to achieve" and I was underwhelmed. The cumbersome glasses did nothing to enhance the already beautiful set and in many instances – when I took my glasses off – had actually dulled the screen. All of this instantly lowered my enthusiasm of wanting to see this movie.

The story mostly stays true to Fitzgerald's novel, but there are always a few screenwriters who want to change a few things to leave their own mark on the film; and that happens in a few places. The entire cast is perfectly matched with its characters. There's Nick Carraway (Tobey Maguire), a wannabe writer new to New York. But he does have a cousin who just happens to be Daisy (Carey Mulligan), a beautiful girl who happened to meet Gatsby years before and left his heart beating for her ever since. When Gatsby befriends Nick it's only so he can get back into Daisy's life. That's not easy since she's married to Tom (Joel Edgerton). Even though he ignores her and is a philandering husband, she can't seem to break the bond and let go.

For most of the movie Di-Caprio is solid as Gatsby. He's mysterious, charming and very loving when he and Daisy spend time together. He's an exceptionable actor and only in a few scenes where he's angry at Daisy does he jump out of character. Mulligan could play a piece of pizza and win an Oscar. She melts every whim of Daisy's topsy-turvy emotions into an engaging and alluring character that's hard to take one's eyes off of. Mulligan and DiCaprio have great chemistry together.

Maguire has found the perfect role for him in Nick. There's never a moment that doesn't feel real when he's frozen with fear that something bad will happen to Daisy. Or when he can see through a plot of Gatsby's but is so intrigued by the man he doesn't react. It's a wonderful performance, even the hypnotic way he recites the story from the writer's view point. I really believed him when he said about Gatsby, "He's the single most hopeful person I ever met." Edgerton is great as a man we love to hate. There's a lack of emotion in Tom that only roars when he's about to lose something he wants to possess not cherish.

Catherine Martin's delectable costumes are already screaming Oscar and there's a reason she's a Two-time Academy Award®-winning production and costume designer for Moulin Rouge. Beverly Dunn had a huge challenge as set director to fill the mansion with just the right objects in Gatsby's world; and she did a splendid job.

I give the story and acting elements of *Gatsby* high marks. But very low ones and disappointment by Luhrmann's (Moulin Rouge) thinking he can bring a new audience into a 1925 story by adding retro music and dance styles and a making the film 3-D where the only thing I remember that was in 3-D was a short scene of snowflakes. I don't see a contemporary story as Luhrmann strived for; I see a classic with tattered edges. It's like taking a bowl of homemade soup and adding rose buds on top to liven it up. It ends up spoiling them both.

Continued from page 11 Misconception #1: Happiness is about getting the big things right. It's natural to think that if we were suddenly rich, beautiful and living on the beach somewhere, we'd be happy. But that type of good fortune turns out to have a surprisingly small impact on happiness. The happiest people are most often not those in the most enviable circumstances, but those who cultivate positive emotional outlooks and actions. So how can we do it? "Take concrete steps to practice optimism, gratitude, kindness and selfcompassion in your everyday life," says Wallace. "The cumulative effect of those everyday choices can have a tremendous impact on how you experience vour life.'

• Misconception #2: Happy people suppress negative emotions. Happy people actually experience sadness, grief, worry and other so-called negative emotions nearly as frequently as unhappy people do. The difference is what happens when those feelings occur. Happier people are generally able to experience negative feelings without losing hope for the future. "They give themselves permission to feel sad, angry, or lonely, but they remain confident that things will get better. As a result, their sadness progresses into hope and action rather than regressing into anxiety and despair."

• Misconception #3: Pursuing happiness is selfcentered. The strongest of all conclusions drawn by researchers into emotional wellbeing is that our happiness is determined more by our relationships with other people than by any other single factor. The happiest people build their lives around good, trusting relationships. "If other priorities are getting in the way of your relationships," says Wallace, "take steps to shift the balance back to where it will really make a difference.

• Misconception #4: I'll be happy when I achieve my goals. Have you ever noticed that when someone wins the Super Bowl or an Academy Award, or when you achieve a long-sought ambition, that wonderful sense of accomplishment and happiness seems to fade faster than you'd expect? "That's just the way our brains work," says Wallace. "Committed goal pursuit is one of the keys to a happy life, but most of the happiness we get from striving for goals comes while we're making progress toward them, not after we achieve them. That's why it's so important that we choose goals that are in synch with what we love and value, and that we make a conscious effort to enjoy them along the way."

Radio began for Kelly at the age of 10. His first exposure was from his mothers' suggestion to visit a radio show doing a remote broadcast at a nearby shopping center.

KCBQ at Seventh and Ash streets then became the place to hang out. From the street level he and his friends could watch the famous "Hit Paraders" DJ's doing their shows live from their second floor glass windowed KCBQ studios, spinning records, entertaining the public, inspiring the youth.
