For Health's Sake

Can't Sleep? Deprivation can lead to problems

n a 2002 poll conducted by the National Sleep Foundation, only 30 percent of adults log a full 8 hours of sleep each night. The average married mom gets 6.7 hours. Viejas hosts Teen Awareness for parents and teens

Giggles and a few mentions of twitter or YouTube could be heard coming from a room at the Viejas Education Center on April 13. The teens were not gathered for social reasons, however. Local Sheriffs, a California Highway Patrol officer and participants from the District Attorney's Office were there to kick off the 3-day "I Believe in Myself," awareness event for parents and teens to create self-esteem.

The professional workshops covered a variety of topics including cultural history, spiritual healing, self-esteem, juvenile court and the law, driving, drug/alcohol/gang awareness, probation, crime prevention, Internet safety, cultural activities and a presentation by MADD.

Alan Barrett, a former Tribal Councilman, who along with Tribal member Vera Tucker, coordinated the program, began the first session by explaining to the students and parents in attendance, why the Tribe was still under local law enforcement.

"The Constitution of the United States gave us sovereignty to govern ourselves, but after 150 years the federal government decided that tribes are not able to police themselves," Barrett explained. "So they created Public Law 280, and there are six states in the United States that have to abide by this law, California being one of them. Public Law 280 gives the criminal jurisdiction over to the state which then gives it over to the county. That's why we have sheriffs on the reservation."

Jesse Navaro, the Public Affairs Officer for the District's Attorney's Office of the County of San Diego, addressed the group. "Most of the crimes on the reservation end up in our office," he said. "We decide which cases are going forward and which are not."

Sheriffs Jason Rouse and John Whiteman from the County's Juvenile Division held a slide show presentation explaining their roles in working with youths. Points covered included handling runaways, missing and abducted children, teen relations and working as liaisons with the courts.

"We all want a safe society," Rouse told the crowd. "And we want kids to understand it's not kids versus law enforcement. We're on your side and want to create a safe environment for kids."

Whiteman outlined what the system does to try to keep children out of the court system, including SARB (School Attendance Review Board). He explained school attendance in California is mandatory until the age of 18 and that truancy is a crime and that covers both parents and their children. The leaders also discussed the parents' responsibilities by law to take care of their children and provide food and shelter.

"We set on that board with other community leaders, and if you're brought before the SARB, you'll be issued a contract," Whiteman said. "If you break that contract you'll be sent before a judge and have to see a probation officer."

"You need to keep in mind that the laws are designed to protect our children under 18, and not to harass them or get them in trouble," Superior Court Judge Amalia L. Meza said. "We don't want someone out there late at night where someone could prey on them, or they can get into trouble."

Each day of the program was intended to make the Tribal youth understand that bad behavior has consequences. As Deputy Gaming Commis-

'State of Play' seeks the truth

he strong cast of Russell Crowe, Helen Mirren, Ben Affleck and Rachel McAdams set the bar high for the crime/thriller *State of Play.* Infused with stories that splash across the headlines of today's newspapers – a congressman having an affair, corporate misconduct, a newspaper facing its demise – the movie is intriguing from beginning to end. It easily ascends that high bar.

Cameron Lynne (Helen Mirren) is facing the loss of her prestigious job as editor of the Washington Globe. That's because sales of the paper are down, and it's up to her to keep the presses rolling. When a young woman believed to have committed suicide is linked to a congressional investigation of a corporate company, Cameron has her story.

With a long history as a senior reporter and a nose for news sharper than a blood hound, Cal McAffrey (Crowe) appears the most suited for the job. He immediately senses two recent murders are somehow linked to the woman's death, but he wonders if he's the right one to cover the story. Cal was once best friends with Stephen Collins, the congressman heading up an important government investigation. When news leaks out that the woman who committed suicide was Stephen's mistress, Cal treads even more lightly.

Della Frye (McAdams) is a young reporter eager to acquire bylines. While Cal is old school, she's new day – a blogger who dives in headfirst, sometimes not seeing the big picture. When Cameron assigns her to work on the story with Cal, they're like water and oil.

After Stephen shows up unexpectedly at Cal's, stating his wife (Robin Wright Penn) has thrown him out of the house, Cal is uncertain what to do. Especially recalling Cameron's words – good reporters don't have friends, only sources. Cal offers Stephen a place to stay and asks him some questions, but gets minimal answers.

The plot is based on a 2003 BBC miniseries, and a host of notable writers – Tony Gilroy (Duplicity, Michael Clayton), Matthew Michael Carnahan (The Kingdom, Lions for Lambs), and Billy Ray (Breach, Shattered Glass) – pen a compelling story that's not really about murder, infidelity or corporate corruption. It actually concerns two former best friends who love the same woman and now need each other's help. It's also about trust. Kevin Macdonald (*The Last King of Scotland*) directs with a fluid hand that never lags in creating tension between the layers of the story, each one more enticing than the last.

Crowe, constantly looking tired and hurried, once again nails his character. Cal's career is on the line as he strives to find the truth in his story and meet Cameron's deadlines while making Della realize that sometimes a news story involves doing mundane things. Yet Cal's biggest struggle involves trying to learn the real facts of Stephen's affair, and how many lines he must cross to help or denounce Stephen.

Mirren (*The Queen*) is a natural as the clock-ticking editor, and McAdams serves her part well as a fish out of water who jumps in – sink or swim. Wright Penn does a great job as the restrained but wounded wife.

"The moral ambiguity attracted me to this part," Affleck said. "Here is this powerful, successful young congressman who has absolutely everything to gain...yet he throws it away by having an affair with a woman who winds up murdered. I felt that Stephen believed he was trying to do right by the people in his life he cared for...he just fell apart."

State of Play, one of the best films so far this year, is a great pick for mature audiences.

'Observe and Report' is not entertaining

here was a time when comedies were actually funny. Observe and Report advertises itself as a comedy, and if you think making fun of alcoholism. mental disabilities and worse of all, date rape is amusing; then this film's for you.

Ronnie Barnhardt (Seth Rogan) is a mall cop who might take his job a little too seriously. When a flasher exposes himself out in the parking lot to Brandi (Anna Farris), who works at a make-up counter in the mall, Ronnie makes it his personal mission to find and capture the flasher. He has his designs on Brandi and hopes to impress her.

Police Detective Harrison (Ray Liotta) is assigned to investigate the crime and discovers that Ronnie is a racist, mentally unbalanced, wannabe cop. His only friends, fellow mall cops - the Yuen twins (Matt and John Yuan), Charles (Jesse Plemons), Dennis (Michael Peña) and Dennis's alcoholic mother (Celia Weston), all support Ronnie's never-ending dumb decisions.

Observe and Report is a disjointed film filled with one dreadful joke after another. One minute the film follows the investigation to find the flasher then switches to Ronnie trying to join the police force then transitions to a really bad date movie - such as when Ronnie date-rapes an

alcoholic Brandi as she's in a nearly unconscious state.

Almost everything about the movie is politically incorrect such as profiling people for their race, promoting violence and drugs, and the mistreat-ment of women. None of the characters have any redeeming qualities, and the acting isn't anything special. The conclusion of the movie is outrageous including several full frontal minutes of the flasher running through the mall. And why is that necessary?

Now they did say they would sell me an extended warranty for \$2,000 dollars. They said they would give me a 30 day warranty but if anything goes wrong I would be responsible for 50 percent of the repair bill. Does this seem right to you? I didn't buy the car because I just didn't feel good about the transaction. I do want the car, it is exactly what I want. I checked and it is still on the lot (it has been there for about a month and a half). Any suggestions would be deeply appreciated, keep up the great work! Jan, El Cajon.

Jan: It sounds to me like this used car dealer is running a very tight operation which means he is not making a lot of money on each vehicle he sells. For example, he buys a car from the auction for \$8,000 smog and safety maybe \$100 sells it for \$9500 there is not much room for profit or unexpected repairs that he would have to incur himself. It is a tough time in the car business today so buyer beware, have it checked out by your own technician. Always buy a used car with a good warranty. One more thing, \$2,000 for an extended warranty seems normal today but the question to you is can you afford repairs that could cost \$2,000 or more with out the warranty? Don't forget the deductible, usually \$50 to \$100. Last but not least, if your heart tells you to walk on the deal...walk!

Dave: I just got an email on a new product that will allow you to burn water in your vehicle and gain 40 percent better fuel mileage. Have you heard of it and does it work? Mechelle, Alpine.

HOME funds may be used "to provide incentives to develop and support affordable rental housing and homeownership affordability through the acquisition, new construction, reconstruction, or rehabilitation with suitable amenities, including real property acquisition, site improvement, conversion, demolition and other expenses." It may also be used to provide for the payment of reasonable administrative and planning costs, and to provide for the payment of operating expenses of community housing development organizations (CHDO's) – 24 CFR 92.205(a)." Each participating jurisdiction must set aside 15% of their HOME entitlement for CHDO's. The El Cajon City Council took these tentative actions at the February 24, 2009, public hearing: allocated \$1,234,525 of anticipated CDBG funds, and \$759,051 of anticipated HOME funds. In addition the City Council also allocated \$902,547 of unallocated prior year CDBG and \$477,271 of HOME funds. Preliminary allocations were made and are subject to public review. The projects and programs below reflect those allocations made at the April 14, 2009, public hearing.

The Five-Year Consolidated Plan outlines programs anticipated for 2009-14 and the One-Year Action Plan 2009-10 is the document that provides details of the projects and programs funded through CDBG and HOME funds for Fiscal Year 2009-10. Both plans were available for public review beginning March 12, 2009, for an extended time period through April 14, 2009. This notice only contains new funding and new projects. Projects tha

APDT professional dog trainers' advice for the new 'first dog'

All dogs, whether the "First Dog" or dogs who live on "Main Street," require training and socialization to become happy, harmonious residents in a family's household. Learning should be fun and exciting for

humans and dogs alike, and all family members should become actively involved in the training process

The members were queried about what they would teach the new "First Dog" if they became the White House dog trainer. A detailed listing of their advice can be found on our Dog Trainer Tips page at: http://apdt.com/po/tips/default.aspx. Some highlights include:

1) Use Positive training techniques - The APDT recommends that you use training methods based on positive reinforcement and the latest scientific understandings of dog behavior. This will motivate your dog to choose to follow your commands, rather than doing them out of fear or avoidance. Teaching your dog with the enduring power of love, kindness and respect will create a deeper bond with your dog and family and will provide a profound example for all dog owners in the U.S. The APDT has provided an article on how to find a humane, professional trainer on the APDT's web site at http://www.apdt.com/po/ts/ choose trainer.aspx.

2) Teach proper greeting behavior - Since the "First Dog" will encounter many new people, places and things, socializing to a variety of people, places and experiences on a regular basis and pairing this with positive reinforcement will ensure that he will be a good "ambassador" for all dogs in the U.S.

3) Involve the family and

staff in training – Dogs learn through consistency and repetition; everyone who encounters the dog should be "on the same page" as to how to greet him, what verbal commands and hand signals to use, and what behaviors to reinforce.

4) Use games and play in training – Using games can be a wonderful way, for children in particular, to train a dog to basic thru advanced obedience commands in a positive and fun atmosphere.

5) Provide appropriate chew toys - All dogs, particularly young and adolescent dogs, need to chew. If young dogs are not given proper

chewing outlets, they will easily find the wrong ones! Keep the White House furnishings secure by providing the "First Dog" with food-filled chew toys to exercise his mouth and his mind.

Finding the right adoptable pet for your home

Go outside your house and listen-when you come back, don't make a big deal about being reunited. Be matter of fact; this is how to avoid dogs that develop separation anxieties.

Start training early on and involve your children. That is the best thing you can do for your dog; it fulfills a lot of his needs and you will have a better life together.
