

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

El Cajon leading the way to reduce tobacco sales to minors

Prior to Tuesday's City Council meeting, Communities Against Substance Abuse (CASA), held a news conference in front of the Council Chambers to announce the latest results of a Youth Purchase Survey. The survey found that, thanks to Tobacco Retailer Licensing, since 2004 - tobacco sales to minors dropped 88 percent in the City of El Cajon. More than 60 communities in California have adopted strong

local tobacco retailer licensing ordinances in order to reduce illegal sales of tobacco products to minors. El Cajon City Councilmember Gary Kendrick said he was very happy about the report and challenged neighboring cities to adopt the same tough ordinances to protect the health of our youth.

Last police forum Thursday

Have your questions ready for the last of four El Cajon Police Department Community Neighborhood Forums that began Monday, Aug. 24. The forums covered all sectors in the City. This is an excellent opportunity for residents to ask Police and other City department representatives their questions, or to voice any concerns they may have about their neighborhood. Each forum covered such topics as traffic, graffiti, gangs and how to establish a Neighborhood Watch program. The last sector to be covered tonight is Sector 9 - Thursday night, August 27 - 6 - 7:30 p.m. at Meridian Elementary, 651 S Third Avenue. Watch for major roadwork on streets in El Cajon

Work began Monday on a major resurfacing project that will affect several major streets in El Cajon. Watch for road crews on Fletcher Parkway, working from Westwind Drive down to Graves Avenue. Once that is complete, work will begin on Cuyamaca and some adjoining streets such as Tvrone Street, Aldwych Road and Murray Drive. This will then be followed by work on Chase Avenue. Motorists traveling through these areas can expect some possible delays. The streets mentioned will receive an overlay of high-tech rubberized asphalt, which is much more durable and reduces road noise. Funding for the \$3,379,000 project came from Transportation Development Act funds, Redevelopment Agency funds, TransNet funds, and TransNet-ARRP (Federal Stimulus funds). Please reduce your speed in all areas of construction and watch for traffic control. For more information please call the City of El Cajon Public Works Department at (619) 441-1653.

More traffic control areas

Since June 2009, continuing through the fall of 2010, work on the Jamacha Pipeline will continue. Intermittent lane closures can be expected within the City of El Cajon and in the unincorporated

community of Rancho San Diego in the County of San Diego. This work will involve installing approximately 5.1miles of 36-inch steel pipe to transport drinking water. The pipeline will connect Flow Control Facility No. 14 located at the intersection of Lexington Avenue and Third Street in the City of El Cajon to the Otay Water District's Regulatory Reservoir Complex in Rancho San Diego. Streets expected to have restrictions include Third Street, Dumar, Waterloo, Gustavo, Brabham, Via Rancho San Diego and Fury Lane in Rancho San Diego. Lane closures may occur on Jamacha Road from Gustavo in El Cajon to Brabham in Rancho San Diego. Traffic control and parking restrictions may remain in effect through the extent of the entire project, even though actual pipeline work is ongoing in other areas. Night work will take place along Jamacha Road south of the City of El Cajon as directed by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). Medicine and politics by fear; are we there at too many levels? This comment/question was presented to my staff and I yesterday and we all have not stopped pondering the implications since the brief but powerful patient interaction. It is amazing that all of us listened to the same radio broadcast on the way in to the office commenting on our new leadership's warnings on the H1N1/swine flu. All were dismayed, disappointed and disgusted.

Too date and after reviewing non political predictions, this is a mild flu with less than predicted deaths. Coping With Teen Substance Abuse


Living with a teen who has a substance abuse problem can take an emotional, mental and physical toll on an entire family.

'The Time Traveler's Wife' lacks emotion

often get annoyed when a movie is classified as a chick flick simply because of its romantic plot. And I'm bothered when people assume all females will enjoy it. Actually, romance fans expect more from romantic films. They're aware of plot contrivances and have higher expectations. As past president of a large chapter of Romance Writer's of America for two years, I know this to be true.

Looking forward to *The Time-Traveler's Wife*, I wondered how anything could go wrong with an intriguing time travel twist, a romance, and great actors such as Rachel Mc-Adams and Eric Bana. That's a question I had to keep asking myself after seeing the movie and feeling disappointed.

Time travel, a mechanism used in stories for centuries, can add exciting elements to a plot if it's done well. So a quarter of the way through

this movie, I was okay with learning that Henry (Bana) has been stuck as a time traveler for years. That his clothes disappear right before he's to travel and that he gets a hint it will happen was also acceptable to me.

Those concerns aside, I settled down for the romantic plot. Henry meets the love of his life, Clare (played delightfully by young Brooklyn Proulx, *The Lazarus Project*) at age six and eight. While he

knows her future, the young girl finds him an intriguing guest to her meadow picnic and has no idea he will one day marry her.

When Clare (Rachel Mc-Adams) is grown, she meets Henry again; unaware they met earlier in her life. After a few disappearing acts while they date, he must eventually tell her the truth. To me, Clare accepts this concept rather nonchalantly. In the beginning she's not extremely troubled

about Henry disappearing unexpectedly. However, one of the underlying themes in this movie involves the absence of fathers – for both Henry and Clare, so as the years move on, Clare begins to resent their arrangement.

Most time-travel fans don't need to know the specifics of how it works. They know it's usually different for various products. That said, the process does need to make some sense inside the film where it's included. Therefore, I had more questions than answers when I left *The Time-Traveler's Wife*. For me it was a "if-hecould-do-this-then-why-not-now" type thing.

Not having read Audrey Niffenegger's novel from which this film was adapted by Bruce Joel Rubin, who gave us a terrific film about a man time traveling in *Ghost* (1990), I can't compare the movie to the book. And although I adore Hailey McCann playing the couple's time-traveling daughter, I was ready for the movie to end way before the introduction of this subplot --which didn't ring true with the beginning of the film.

Those looking for outstanding performances from Bana (Star Trek, The Other Boleyn Girl) and McAdams (State of Play) may also be disappointed. While they're lovely to look at, I never felt any emotion in their characters, especially considering they never knew if or when they would see each other again.

The Time-Traveler's Wife isn't a great choice, but considering what's currently playing in theaters, and if watching people get scalped or blasting each other to bits doesn't entice you, this film could be a viable option.

chorts is an out-of-order short film series of episodes about a Wishing Rock that lands in Black Falls Community. Every adult who lives there works for Black Box World Wide Industries Incorporated. Black Box is a do-it-all communication device that's becoming world wide, but the Back Box has done nothing for 11-year-old Toe Thompson (Jimmy Bennett) who just wants to make some friends. Janet's Cafe continues success with another location

anet's Café has been a household name since Ed and Janet Lynch started their first restaurant in 1995 in El Cajon. Shortly after they opened another branch in Rancho San Diego. They eventually sold that one and sold the Greenfield Drive Janet's to her sister Bu this time. Janet's Montana Café. the couple's larger restaurant in Alpine, was in full operation. Broadening their entrepreneur profile once again, the Lynch's have just opened Janet's Café & Deli in Santee.

The new location is located in the Carlton Oaks Plaza in Santee, and nestled in a shadu strip-mall among other businesses. With several intimate booths and a counter inside and tables outside shaded under a roof, the Café has the feel of a quick getaway or a leisure-over-coffee affect. Anyone who knows the reputation of Janet's, knows there is nothing small about their food quality, menu items – which is the full menu offered at Alpine or portion sizes.

It was no surprise for Janet that she would one day end up at the Greenfield Drive restaurant wearing an apron. Lunch items include sandwiches, burgers, fresh salads, fruit, soups and some heartier

The Santee Café is open until 2:30, but Alpine is open seven nights a week as well serving traditional chicken, seafood and steak dinners along with some of Janet's home style dinners including meat loaf, pork chops and liver and onions. Even though as with most businesses, the Lynchs are dealing with increased gas, food, and overall expenses in general, they are determined not to cut

"We're still in business where

many others aren't because we plan ahead and never compromise the quality of our food," Lynch said. "Our regular customers know they get what they pay for and that keeps them coming back, and them and us, happy."

More expansion ideas are in the works for Janet's. "Both of my children. Kristen and Aaron have worked in our restaurants while growing up," she said. "I'm ready for some time off to spend with my grandchild so I'll be bringing in Kristen to run the Santee Café, and we're looking for another location to open for Aaron to run.'



2010 Ford F-150 Raptor

fans who have been waiting patiently for the truck of their dreams, it has arrived! I had an opportunity along with a dozen or so journalists to head out to the birthplace of the 2010 Ford F-150 Raptor, Borrego Springs. Yes it was 115 degrees in the shade but when a truck has to be tested in its element, then who cares about heat!

Let me set the stage. Ford SVT Team (Special Vehicle Team) started out with a well equipped F-150, and then they hooked up with Fox Shoks out of Santee California and put 60 plus hours of shock tuning out in the desert, 60 hours tuning a shock absorbers? Well guess what? Ford and Fox got what they wanted; a truck that can be driven on the street and then when the off road calls all there is to do is drop the tire pressure and hit it!

The 2010 Raptor comes with a 5.4-liter 3-valve EFI V8 engine that produces 320 horsepower and 390 foot pounds of raw torque at 3,500 rpm, and it comes with a 6-speed automatic transmission. A 400 horsepowered version is on the way, but why? The Raptor sits on a box frame that give the truck all the rigidity it needs in the rough stuff. The tires are BF Goodrich LT315/70R-17 All Terrain tires that worked like a champ. There are also coil-on-shocks, (Fox Shoks) long spindle, double wishbone independent, aluminum lower control arms with SVT scripted in the arms, nice touch and it comes with forged upper steel arms that are all in the front end. In the rear — a Hotchkiss-type non-independent live leaf springs and out board Fox Shoxs with a reservoir shock to handle the terrain.

Of course it comes with an upgraded interior, Raptor specific and with a great gauge package, which includes all the gauges one would need to hit the desert with confidence. For the guy who likes options Raptor gives a four switch hard wired connector for all extra things like lights, winch etc. etc. all located in the center console.

I can go on and on about all the bells and whistles one will find in the Raptor but what I really want to tell about how it handles on the open road, desert, and one mother of a mountain we had to climb up, and then climb down!

We started in San Diego, tires pumped up and two journalists to a Raptor, and off we went south through Chula Vista, to Jamul, then up through Ramona then Julian (sorry no pie stop) then down onto the desert floor. We stayed the night at the Borrego Ranch Resort, had dinner, went to bed early and got up early to beat the sun and headed to the open desert but first our tech team dropped the tire pressure to 28 psi and the first challenge was to drive the Raptor up to 70 miles per hour in the sandy river beds with lots of woops. We had an SVT engineer riding with us to answer any questions we may have. My SVT engineer was Hether, a Ford Noise, Vibration and Harshness Engineer, and let me tell you she should get an A+ for her and her team's effort. My tester was quiet and solid on the open road as well as the desert. Then we went to the rock crawl portion of the event. Locking into low four wheel drive up the mountain we went, lots of shale and lose rocks and throw in a little sand and the pucker power increases, then we get to the top of the mountain (all I could see out the windshield was sky!) Our desert master, Larry Rae guided our truck to the edge of the mountain, had us engage Ford's Hill Decent and his last words were, "If you touch the brake pedal you owe me a beer!" At that moment the Raptor dropped over the ridge and I stood on the floor board as if I was standing up! The Raptors Hill Decent kicked in and down the grade we went, slow and sure, once at the bottom flick off the Hill Decent button and you're back tearing through the desert. (No I didn't owe him, a beer!)

I will have more information on my weekly radio show on KCBQ 1170 Saturdays from 3 to 5 pm; I will get SVT to call in.

The truck starts out at \$38,995 plus tax and license and there is no competition, none. If there was a negative it would be the test drive at the dealer. Unless he has a lot of sand in the back yard drivers won't get the idea SVT had when the started the project back in 2006, but if a desert trip is made in a Raptor, it will be bought! It is the first purpose built vehicle that has hit a bull's eye!





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

Dear Trainer,

have two cats that I got around the same time, one is a 7 year old spayed female who is a real love bug, and the other is a 2 year old neutered male that is kind of wild and very active. The younger cat is always chasing and attacking the older one, and now I think the female is spraying urine on the wall, if that's possible. I didn't think females could spray, but it sure seems like it because the urine is on the walls, not on the floor. What can I do to stop this and how do I get the area clean so it doesn't smell?

Dear Crazy,

Before we talk about behavior, it's really important to make sure both of your cats have a clean bill of health, including blood work to eliminate any potential underlying health issue. Cats that are over 5 vears, such as your female are more subject to disease and illness and should have check ups every 6 months, including yearly blood panels to ensure their health and to establish a baseline.

Yes, it does sound like your female cat is spraying, and yes, they do spay. Cats often start spraying when they are anxious about territory and space, so I would guess that the female is feeling some anxiety about your rowdy male cat and his play and attack antics. Unfortunately, a busy active male that is young and an older sedate female makes for strange bedfellows. Most experts would consider that the most problematic mix

of cats and this may very well be the root of your urine spraying issue.

It's also important to note that while most spraying is steeped in territorial issues or anxiety, overall household stress can also trigger this problem. Be sure to look for other signs of stress or changes in the household or environment. Some are not as obvious as others

The following are some things that have been associated with spraying problems:

- Visitors
- A change of routine like a new job with different hours
- Remodeling or rearranging furniture
 - Moving the cat boxes
- Not having enough cat boxes
- Having the cat box in a location where the female has to walk the gauntlet past the
 - Loud noises outside
 - And many more...

Solving the problem

First, be sure you are feeding your cats a very good diet and put them on a schedule if vou don't do that alreadv-- that gives you some good training times to help the male expel some energy via training, interaction and mental exercise. Feed two meals a day so the male has to eat more and fill up, which triggers cats to rest and digest their meals. When they nibble all day, they have a constant supply of energy available to them, and the male may take burn it off via going after the female cat.

Overall stress reduction is another thing you can do to dissuade your cat from marking. An easy fix is to introduce Feliway into the room. Feliway

is a pheromone product that is available online or at the pet stores. It comes in two forms, an aerosol spray or a plug-in. The pheromone smell that is only detectable by cats gives them a sense of calm when emitted into the area where the spraying has been happening. Another trick is you can take a rag or a wash cloth and stroke the female's fur all over with it to pick up her scent on the cloth. You will then use that to wipe down the areas where she has been spraying, which helps convince her that she has her scent there already. Be sure to clean those areas thoroughly first, however.

Getting the urine smell completely out of the area is not an easy task, but so important, as cats will continue to mark where they have marked in the past if they can detect their odor. Use a good enzyme cleaner for this, (I like Odor Mute) and you may even want to have a professional come out to deep clean if the urine has gotten on the carnet or flooring. Use a black light (sold at all the pet stores) to find the small traces of urine that might have been left behind.

Prevention and manage-

Preventing your female cat from exposure to the male's arousing interactions is the next step. Your female should not have to live in fear that she will be beat up or attacked. so you might have to change the living arrangements when you are not home to supervise. Setting the female up in a room where the door can be closed is a good solution. Make it a nice place for her to be alone, with access to water, toys and comfortable bedding. Having a climbing tree for her can also give her a sense of security as vertical height is like adding an extra room to your house in terms of how much space cats needs. It will also give her a way to keep an eye on the other cat. Climbing trees might also help the male burn off energy and if you put it in front of a window that has an outside bird feeder. he may choose to watch that more than bother the female.

You could also add an extra litter box or two in case she is spaying because the male is blocking her travel to the current litter box location(s).

Using deterrents such as double-sided carpet tape, aluminum foil, or moving something into the areas to block her from spraying in a particular location can also help. Limit your choices to these mild aversive tools as you never want to hurt or punish your cat for doing a very natural behavior that is her way of feeling safe. Besides, many studies have shown that punishing spraying often creates more anxiety and more global spraying, where as, right now: it is limited.

Calming your cat from the inside can also help with spraying issues. As mentioned, be sure your cat is eating a diet that is not adding to her anxiety via the ingredients, nor giving the male excess energy. Look for low or no grain foods to help reduce extra energy. There are also some good herbal remedies that can also help with calmness.

Exercise is another important component to help lower anxiety in cats, so be sure you are spending at least 15-20 each

day with both cats. This will help the male direct his energy away from the female, and will help the female relax and rest.

These problems can take time, (sometimes up to 6 weeks) before they are resolved, so you will want to be pro-active in managing your cat's space and activities around each other.

If you are unable to resolve the problem after putting these ideas into play, be sure to contact a veterinarian behaviorist to see if medications might be needed during the re-adjustment period.

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


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
