'My Sister's Keeper' is heartfelt but not cliché

rom front page news to the big screen comes the plot for *My Sister's* Keeper, a melodrama based on the book by Jodi Picoult. The story concerns a couple who genetically engineer a baby to help save the life of their daughter dying from cancer. Naturally, the movie is a roller coaster of emotions, but director Nick Cassavetes (John Q) keeps the film churning with some clever ideas and steers his actors onto solid ground.

Since being conceived in vitro by her parents Sara and Brian (Cameron Diaz and Jason Patric), Anna (Abigail Breslin) has been a DNA match for her sister Kate's (Sofia Vassilieva) worn out parts - starting even before she was born. About to be asked to donate a kidney, the more-than-mature 10-yearold Anna, has had enough. No longer wanting to be a guinea pig, she hires TV attorney Campbell Alexander (Alec Baldwin) to sue her parents for medical emancipation.

Sara is appalled when Anna

turns against her sister knowing it means Kate will surely die. What's really interesting here is that the sisters' relationship doesn't waver. Kate seems okay with her sister's decision, and Anna is as nurturing as ever of Kate. Breslin plays Anna as almost a split personality. The two siblings spend time together, laughing, crying, and making sure they will never forget each other.

Vassilieva (Day Zero), who has mostly starred in TV roles, delivers an exceptional performance in My Sister's Keeper. While it's natural for an audience to feel the tug of symphony for her character, Vassilieva endows Kate with such hope, bravery and optimism! During the entire film, it's those traits that shine through in this sweet, smiling character.

While Sara is so angry she battles Anna in court about her decision, Brian sees the price his young daughter has paid for the decision he and Sara made long ago. Budding up to Anna only widens the rift in the

family as they face days of pain and lost hope. Patric (*In the Valley of Elah*) also deserves acclaim for his work here. As Brian, he's patient, insightful and proactive.

The girls' brother Jesse (Evan Ellingson) has a mysterious reaction to his sisters' ordeals. He hangs out around dark street corners in town, and it's not clear why until much later in the film. Elling-

son (Letters From Iwo Jima, 2006) handles the intrigue well. Taylor, a fellow patient and Kate's romantic interest, is played perfectly by Thomas Dekker (TV's Terminator: The Sarah Connor Chronicles). Although Baldwin is amusing as Anna's attorney, he never plays the role over the top as one might expect.


Members of the Fitzgerald family face several battles and

each one must make his/her own decision on what path to follow. The audience goes along for this ride, which includes tender moments as well as vivid revelations of what this killer disease is like. Cameron Diaz provides one of her best performances in the difficult role of Sara.



'Transformers: Revenge of the Fallen' — same stuff, just worse

Jansformers: Revenge of the Fallen is director Michael Bay's eighth film. Audiences have typically embraced most of his films while critics seem to consistently dislike them. **The Rock** (1996) may be the only exception to the split decision. Rise of the Fallen, the sequel to the 2007 Transformers, continues the already weak storyline based on the 1980s cartoon.

Sam Witwicky (Shia LaBeouf) is heading off to college, leaving his girlfriend Mikaela Banes (Megan Fox) and guardian Autobot bumblebee behind. Before leaving for college, Sam finds a sliver of the Allspark, the life source of the Transformers, and triggers a subconscious program in Sam's brain, containing Transformer ancient knowledge. The Deceptioons want that knowledge because it contains the whereabouts of a sun harvester set up on earth in 17,000 BC by Fallen (voice by Tony Todd). He's an ancient Deceptioon that broke the rule about destroying suns in galaxies that contain life, and was then betrayed by his own kind to save Earth.

In the present, Optimus Prime (Voice of Peter Cullen) and the Autobots are now part of a US military alliance called NEST. Lead by Major Lennox (Josh Duhamel) this secret organization is dedicated to hunting down the rogue Decepticons. They get in trouble with the President of the United States when they foul up a job in Shanghai, China. The

president sends inept National Security Advisor Galloway (John Benjamin Hickey), to oversee the project and eventually shut it down because he believes the Autobots are the reason the Decepticons remain on Earth.

This sequel contains more computer graphics then the first and that's about the only good thing about the film. A few of the Autobots have more personality, especially Mupflap and Skids (voiced by Reno Wilson and Tom Kenny), who come across as racist stereotypes. There is plenty of cheap toilet humor, dogs having sex, Sam's mom (Julie White) eating marijuana brownies and overreacting to them embarrassing her son and husband (Kevin Dunn), Deceptioon robot Soundwave (voice by Frank Welker) dry humping Mikaelas leg, and old robots that fart para-

Just as in the first *Transformers*, good acting is not a requirement in this film, and it shows. Megan Fox is merely on board as a sex symbol, which she demonstrates in almost every scene thanks to Michael Bay's overabundant use of slow motion and elaborate camera sweeps.

Audiences that liked the gadgetry of the first film will no doubt enjoy this version if they are not expecting anything new. It's hard to dish a movie that pulled in more than one million dollars the first weekend, but three out of four critics agree with me that Transformers: Revenge of The

Fallen is a repeat of the original but worse in every aspect and way too long.



Teaching young children the value of getting along with others can be challenging at times. Tuckie Fromm Wynne's *The Canine Picnic* demonstrates how even the most traditional enemies can learn to be friends. A much needed lesson in today's world.

The dogs go on a picnic, which is crashed by a group of mean cats. A fight ensues and has to be broken up by Sheriff St. Bernard. Under orders, the dogs and cats cease their fighting and sit down to a friendly lunch. They even clean up after themselves. Lessons are taught and learned.

The Canine Picnic has the look and feel of a Richard Scarry book but with only a hint of the hidden surprises that made Scarry's books so

special. The illustrations by Howard Chaney are gorgeous. His dogs and cats are visually appealing, and children will love them. Wynne's "dog" gerel poetry is ordinary, and the black lettering when printed on a dark green background doesn't stand out enough. Still, the book has appeal to very young children, who will enjoy the pictures and hopefully absorb the lesson the feisty canines and felines teach.

Earning Serendipity

There are so many books about leadership and how to achieve success on the bookshelves these days it's intimidating. I was skeptical when first picked up *Earning Serendipity*, but I was immediately intrigued by LLopis' simple logic and insight on his business philosophy.

LLopis not only believes in serendipity, he instructs how to find it and use it to control the path of prosperity. In his foreword, Adlai Wertman, Founding Director of Marshall School of Business at the University of Southern California said about earning serendipity, "it requires looking at the world in a new way and maneuvering through that world in a determined and structured manner."

In my interview with LLopis he revealed how much his father, Frank LLopis, influenced his life. His parents were born in Cuba, and his father fled from the revolution to South America where he became a world famous musician. "It was my father who taught me the principles of leadership as a young man," LLopis said. "He would give me tapes and always

answer my questions. This book is my *Tuesdays with Morrie* in regards to my father."

Earning Serendipity fully explains LLopis' ideas that identify four primary characters that can help or hinder your development and how to see and sow opportunities within your field. There are numerous step by step methods throughout the book and a Workplace Serendipity quiz at the end.






