



for training, unaware that Sinestro wants to overthrow the Guardians and create a new order he'll control. Rated "PG-13" – Warner Bros. Home Entertainment.




'Race to Witch Moun-

'Sling Blade' Blu-Ray



red Loegel started at the Beef and Bun fast food restaurant in El Cajon, worked his way up to manager and in his 20 years there became such a fixture many customers thought it was his restaurant.

Like many people who think "everyone has to eat," Fred and his wife Linda decided to take the step to entrepreneurial ownership with their own fast food place. The difference between the Loegel's along with their business partner Bo Lember and many people who take that big step is that the Loegel's have beat the odds and have a thriving business. Next week marks the five year anniversary for Fred's in Alpine, and a few weeks ago the Loegel's opened their second eatery at a former Taco Bell in El Cajon.

"We try harder, and offer a great product for a reasonable price," Fred Loegel said about the businesses success.

Anyone who has tried the restaurant business knows it takes more than that to keep the doors open. In my many

visits to Fred's in Alpine there are always repeat customers enjoying their food, and on the day I visited Fred's in El Cajon it was standing room only and the drive-through was busy.

Serving a good product is key, and with many competitors serving hamburgers it's a challenge to create a better one. Fred's burgers - including a half-pounder, quarterpounder, junior and monster choice - are made fresh and come with a selection of ingredients. Patrons rave about the burger's flavor.

Shirley Dorworth and her family have been Fred's patrons for years. "The food is delicious, the service great and the atmosphere is friendly," she said while watching her granddaughter eye a gumball spiral through a classic machine.

Both restaurants are decorated with a 1950s décor, play 50s and 60s pop tunes and look and feel like by-gone days. With vintage signs on the tables

and walls, classic car images on the Fred's El Cajon tables, it's a fun and pleasant place to dine. I've always found the restaurants kept clean and the service more than accommodating to special requests.

Smart restaurant owners know not to offer too much on a menu but enough to satisfy every palate in the family. Fred's extended menu includes a grilled chicken, patti melt, Philly cheese, hot dog, corn dog, fish and chips and chicken nugget choice. Fred's crispy fries are another favorite customers rave about.

The Alpine Fred's is home

to monthly car shows and the drivers have found the Loegel's so special that when the Alpine restaurant was robbed a few days before Christmas in 2006 while Fred was in the hospital. the car clubs rallied to clean up the mess from the robbery, serve customers and replaced the stolen money.

A 50s' diner is nothing without shakes and malts. Fred's has them in assorted flavors including banana, vanilla, chocolate, strawberry, peanut butter, chocolate peanut butter, Oreo cookie and mocha. Jason Taub, one of a group of business men who came to Fred's during my visit, said he comes for the shakes. They're the best in town. My favorite is the peanut

Loegel puts in long hours but knows it's paid off in the past. 'We offer something unique, and I think we've found a niche in the community," he said. "Sales are good and our willingness to be a good community partner is coming back to us. Of course it helps that they like our food, too!

'Funny People' is not that funny

fter seeing the previews of Funny People I was under the impression that this movie would be about funny people making us laugh. Once the movie started I slowly discovered that this is more of a drama than a comedy. Funny People is a gruesome 90 minutes long that will test moviegoer's remain-in-your-seats tolerance.

George Simmons (Adam Sandler) is a successful standup comedian and movie star who loves the easy life. He's a self absorbed womanizer who finds out he has an almost incurable blood disorder. Now facing death, he quickly starts to reexamine his life and realizes he has no friends or family to rely on.

Ira Wright (Seth Rogen) is a struggling standup comedian working full time at a deli. After a poor performance at a local comedy club - George, who watched Ira's dismal routine - calls Ira to hire him as a personal assistant at an incredible pay rate. When Ira learns about George's fate the two become close friends. Their friendship is strained, however, when George rekindles his love for his old flame, Laura (Leslie Mann), who is married to Clarke Anderson (Eric Bana) and they have two

Had I known this movie wasn't going to be humorous, I might have enjoyed it more. Adam Sandler is not my idea of an actor to take on serious roles. He only has two looks, happy and sad. His career started as a ridiculous nonsensical actor who made funny noises and acted like a child with a potty mouth, and it's hard to see him as anything else.

One major flaw of the movie

is the audience's inability to relate to the main character, George. I didn't find myself cheering for anyone in this movie since I couldn't really relate to any of them. I've seen tons of comedies. Some manage to sneak in a few chuckles here and there but most of them fall flat. Directed by Judd Apatow, Funny People is a somewhat enjoyable film as long as the audience doesn't expect what the title suggests.

'Julie & Julia' is delightfully amusing

f anyone can over-act a character and get away with it's Meryl Streep. Give the script of Mamma Mia to most actresses, and you'd probably hear, "you must be kidding." In the hands of Meryl Streep the film has grossed more than 600 million worldwide. This past week I've heard more people repeat the same comment than ever before – "the woman can play anything."

Those comments are coming from people who have already seen *Julie & Julia*, writer-director Nora Ephron's double story about how Julia Child (Meryl Streep) became a

world famous cook and Julie Powell (Amy Adams), a young girl struggling with her life who decides to write a book while cooking her way through Julia Child's cookbook. The movie is based on the 2005 book Julie & Julia by Julie Powell and My Life in France, the 2006 memoir by Julia Child with Alex Prud'homme.

The story of Julia begins with her life in France in the late 1940s where her devoted husband Paul (Stanley Tucci) has been assigned to work. One can only shop for so long in Paris, so Paul pushes Julia to pursue her love of cooking. The tall, giddy woman is a misfit in any kitchen, but Julia manages to defy the odds

even landing a spot in the prestigious Cordon Bleu.

Transition fifty years forward and Julie Powell finds herself restless and unfulfilled as a writer. Her love of good food spawns the idea to spend a year writing a blog about cooking the 524 recipes in Julia Child's Mastering the Art of French Cooking. Julie's husband Eric (Chris Messina) isn't sure that's such a good idea but doesn't dissuade his wife. And why would he when he can have dishes like boeuf bourguignon, mousse de foies de volaille or delightful desserts such as tarte au citron et aux amandes.

Julie & Julia constantly juxta-

positions between the women's two worlds and shows us they have more in common than food. They have passion. Julia has a *joy de vie* that is present in almost every scene, and she also has a very successful and close-knit – almost storybook like – marriage. Streep said she cried when she read the script and found the character of Julia and her zest for life and curiosity about many things quite appealing.

"The idea that what you put in front of your family, that love, those connections between people, are the real important things," Streep said. "Her approach to her day was one of energy and appetite and a blanket determination not to





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

let troubles get you down. It's a great quality and she really had it."

Streep has that quality as well in her resplendent portrayal of Child. Her mere awkwardness and delightful, "Bon Appétit!" offer constant amusement in the film. Anyone who ever watched the wonderful Child on TV gets a sweet reminder of what a dear and one-of-a-kind woman she was.

Adams has definitely impressed moviegoers the last few years. Including her Academy Award nominations for Best Performance by an Actress in a Supporting Role in 2005 for *Junebug* and 2008 for the blindsided nun in *Doubt*, Adams has also given us delightful roles as a middle-aged London governess in *Miss Pettigrew Lives for a Day* (2008) and a gutsy single mom in *Sunshine Cleaning* (2008).

In Julie & Julia her passion is not really to cook, but to make changes in her life, determine if her career and her marriage are working and set an unrealistic goal for herself – which certainly happens while trying to cook world-class dishes in her tiny New York apartment.

"She's really come to a crossroads, and she's trying to make decisions," Adams said. "That was something I was very familiar with, and I don't think it's reflected very often in films in an honest way. For a more modern woman, there are some very all-encompassing questions, and I thought this character really embodied that journey and that confusion."

Tucci (Kit Kittredge: An American Girl) is also a casting plus. He reminds me of Jack Lemmon's everyman because he makes his character viable in almost every film, whether funny, serious or animated. As Paul, Tucci never fails to make us believe he's a devoted husband who always has Julia's back.

With good direction by Ephron – who has been noticeably absent as writer, director or producer for four years – spot on cinematography by Stephen Goldblatt (Closer) and Alexandre Desplat's The Curious Case of Benjamin Button great score, Julie & Julia has a lot going for it. The movie doesn't knock your socks off but is a delightful treat and will certainly make you hungry. And, after all, it's got Meryl Streep!


