oviegoers often moan when learning about upcoming remakes or sequels because they rarely live up to the original. Fortunately, Disney's Race to Witch Mountain finds new ground that makes it suitable for young children. It's been almost 30 years since the original film, Escape to Witch Mountain, debuted, so there's an entirely new audience for the adventure film. Also, Race to Witch Mountain stars Dwayne Johnson, who makes his character feel authentic and is compelling to watch.

Johnson (*The Game Plan*)



leading them -- with the teens in the back -- on a crazy chase through the Nevada desert.

Eventually the kids explain they're from outer space, but it takes a few rather stupendous stunts to prove this to Jack. The youngsters are trying to find their space ship, which the U.S. government has hidden. Jack is sympathetic when he learns the teens are in a race against time to save their

planet from extinction and a plan to then invade Earth.

There are many scenes here requiring a suspension of disbelief, but overall the film comes across as fun for voungsters. Robb (Bridge to Terabithia) and Ludwig (The Seeker: The Dark Is Rising) offer nothing extraordinary in their performances but often hold their own with Johnson - who nicely steals the show. Carla Gugino

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plays Dr. Alex Friedman, an astrophysicist attending a UFO convention in Vegas. Jack remembers delivering her to a hotel and seeks her help when government officials are trying to capture the teen aliens.


I'm a close observer of the audience when screening a movie for review, and the children watching Race to Witch Mountain at the same time I did seemed to thoroughly enjoy this movie. However, the long opening sequence resembled something akin to a Quentin Tarantino film attempting to explain UFO conspiracies. It bored and confused me, so I'm sure youngsters had no clue what it was supposed to portray. Still, once the movie began, I saw the kids laughing, clapping and sitting on the edge of their seats many times throughout the film.

I was slightly uneasy with some of the big-governmentis-bad aspects of the film, but I think the children were too involved in the adventure and the chase to focus on those aspects. Johnson, Gugino (Watchmen) and Garry Marshall -- as an amusing UFO expert -- provide enough entertainment to keep parents favorably involved in the film.

Alpine's child movie star takes his last bow at 96




Coy Watson in the 1924 film, *Dorothy Vernon of Hadden Hall.* Photos courtesy Watson archives.

James Caughey "Coy" Watson, Jr., 96, went home to be with our Lord and Savior on Saturday, March 14, 2009. Coy and his wife, Willie, have lived in Alpine for 19 years.

Coy Watson born November 16, 1912, in his home in Edendale, California, a suburb of Los Angeles. From the age of nine months to 21, Coy appeared in more than 65 motion pictures, and became know as "The Keystone Kid." His father, Coy Watson Sr., was an early motion picture pioneer who worked as an assistant director and special effects man for many studios, and periodic "Keystone Cop" movies for Mack Sennett Studios.

Coy Jr. appeared in early silent pictures and "talkies" with Hollywood greats such as Lon Chaney, Mari Pickford, Mae West, Cary Grant, Fatty Arbuckle, and Jackie Coogan.



Coy attended school on studio lots and various Los Angeles' schools before graduating in 1933. He was active in Boy Scouts, worked with boys at camps and helped establish a camp for delinquent boys. In 1929 Coy stepped behind the camera to pursue a career in news photography. He worked with Pacific and Atlantic Photos news-picture syndicate, which became Acme New Pictures, still later becoming UPI and now, Reuters. In 1936 he helped found, and in 1946 became president, of the Los Angeles Press Photographers Association. Working with such organizations as Acme. The Los Angeles Post Record, The Los Angeles Times, and The Los Angeles Herald Express, he photographed all types of news stories for local and national newspapers and magazines. Coy's photos appeared in the first and second issues of LIFE magazine -- November and December, 1936.

Like his father, Coy was an inventor and in 1939 manufactured the Coy Watson Lite Beam Focuse, a built-in camera device for focusing in total darkness. Coy served his country (1942 - 1945) in the US Coast Guard during World War II as a Boatswains Mate and Chief Photographer. At a 1943 Hollywood Bowl Madam Chiang Kai-shek show to raise awareness and money for China, Coy took official still photos of Coast Guard personnel and movie stars for the Coast Guard and newspapers. He also took 16 mm motion pictures that became the first filmed news story ever to be televised in the Los Angeles area on L.A.'s first television station. There were less than 40 TV sets in the city at that time

In 1945, Coy Watson Photos was established to serve the Los Angeles area with photographic and public relations services. In 1948 he became a TV news and film photographer "stringer" for local and national news services and became a member of the International Photographers of the Motion Picture Industries Union (IATSE) Local 659. In 1949, NBC/New York assigned Coy to film the historic story of Kathy Fiscus, a little girl who had fallen into an abandoned




Coy Watson, behind CBS camera

well. It was the first news story in California to be televised live and ran continuously for 52 hours.

In 1949, Coy shot Hollywood's first TV commercial on film for Vermont Motors. It aired between the televising of the Santa Anita horse races. The film replaced the usual "ad-card," advertising. That same year he made the first TV film documentary, Operation Endurance for McMillian Oil, featuring two former W.W. II pilots "staying in the air" in a one-engine plane over 1,000 hours (42 days). Coy's capturing the non-stop re-fuelings, family-on-the-ground and other elements became an historic event

Coy and syndicated Hollywood columnist Erskine Johnson joined together to made Hollywood Reel; the first American television series featuring the real lives of motion picture stars. In the 1950s Coy pioneered television news as the first TV news director of the CBS station in Los Angeles, KNXT-TV. He originated the Man on the Street Interview; spotlighting average citizens and their views on current events. In the '60s, he worked in television news at KABC-TV, LA: KTLA LA; KCRA TV, Sacramento; and TVW-TV in Perth, Western Australia. In 1965, Coy took his pioneering spirit and family to Perth, Western Australia to train the TV film news department at TVW, ABC (Australia Broadcasting Co.) Coy received a Lifetime Achievement Award in 1997 from The Press Photogra-

phers Association of Greater Los Angeles for his dedication, pioneering foresight and professionalism in the arena of news photography.

In 1999, Coy Watson Jr. and his parents, Coy Sr. and Golda Watson, and five brothers and three sisters were honored with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. Known as the "First Family Of Hollywood," the nine kids literally grew up in Hollywood. Coy Sr. started with the Mack Sennett Studio in 1912, and collectively the family appeared in more than 1,000 motion pictures with some motion picture's biggest stars.

During his golden years Coy reflected on his life by publishing *The Keystone Kid: Tales of Early Hollywood* in 2001, a book about his early years in motion pictures. In 2004 he received a San Diego Emmy Award for *San Diego Insider: Coy Watson, The Keystone Kid,* a documentary by COX San Diego Channel 4 about his life. Along with his many accolades, "firsts" and professionals achievements, Coy was a wonderful father, grand and greatgrand father, brother, husband and friend. His incredible sense of humor was a joy to all who knew him. He always tried to make people feel good, with a joke or kind word, wherever he went.

Coy was the eldest of the "nine Watson kids" followed by Vivian, Gloria, Louise, Harry, Billy, Delmar, Garry and Bobs. Coy is survived by his wife, Willie; son James Caughey "Jim" Watson III of Perth, Western Australia; daughter, Pattie Watson Price of Alpine; sister Louise Roberts; brother Billy Watson; brother Garry Watson as well as three grand children, four great-grandchildren, and many loving nieces and nephews.

Coy Watson will be memorialized at a family ceremony and his remains will be interred at Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery at a later date.

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
