**June 5 - 7:** Air Group One, the San Diego wing of the Commemorative Air Force will present their annual Wings Over Gillespie Air Show at Gillespie Field in El Cajon. The Commemorative Air Force has the largest airworthy collection of former military aircraft in the world. It has over 150 flyable combat aircraft, making it the world's seventh largest air force! The CAF's members number over 10,000 worldwide, composing 80 wings in 30 states and 4 countries. The large casino rests on top of a mesa just a short jaunt off Highway I-8. A couple of quick turns glided us right into their spacious parking lot adjacent to San Diego County's only Truck Stop Casino. It's open 24/7 to provide fuel, food, and fun.

Our party tried three different entrees. The Chicken Alfredo pasta was exceptional, zesty, lots of sauce and very plentiful, served with crispy garlic bread. The Chicken Fried Steak dinner with mashed potatoes and veggies was just as it appeared on the menu. The steak was tender, and the potatoes were fresh made. The Cheeseburger came just as ordered with extra goodies to pile on top, and the French Fries were crisp and fresh. Our server was attentive and pleasant and our food arrived in a reasonable time. We were all pleased.

For those who just want a quick break in the action, the Del Oro Deli sets near the full service cocktail bar and is open daily from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

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### 'Angels and Demons' — Never lets up its pace

obert Langdon (Tom Hanks) is at it again, caught between two powerful organizations trying to destroy each other. Instead

of the Opus Dei vs. Priory of Sion in the The Da Vinci Code, it's now the Vatican vs. the Illuminati

When the Pope unexpectedly dies, the papal conclave must convene to elect the new pontiff. While that is happening, the ancient sect of the Illuminati surfaces again and steals a dangerous time bomb from a supercollider experiment. The group has also kidnapped

the preferiti, the four Cardinals under consideration to replace the Pope, with expressed intent to murder them publicly before they detonate the antimatter.

Harvard symbologist Lang-

don is summoned once again by the Swiss Guard, a specialized police force that protects the Pope in Vatican City. They need his help before the bomb destroys Vatican City along with thousands of onlookers waiting to see who the new pontiff is and ultimately proves to the Catholic church that science is more powerful then faith.

Langdon meets Vittoria Vetra (Ayelet Zurer), a physicist who worked on the antimatter and who hopes to se-

cure it before it explodes. Langdon is aided by Camerlengo Patrick McKenna (Ewan Mc-Gregor). He is the only one who certifies the death of the Pope by destroying the Pope's ring with his

acting head of state of Vatican City. Camerlengo allows Langdon access to the archives that he's been refused to look at for years to complete his studies. Camerlengo realizes only a symbologist can research the "Path of Illumination," and track down the Illuminati to find the location of the bomb and stop the murders of the cardinals.

Hanks brings his precise acting skills to the film but is limited by his character's boring persona that isn't any different than in The Da Vinci Code. Although he had a lot of screen time, it was a little difficult for me personally to distinguish McGregor from his previous roles. Stellan Skarsgård credibly plays bullish Commander Richter, head of the Swiss Guard. Veteran actor Armin Mueller-Stahl, plays the dignified Cardinal Strauss, Camerlengo's challenger within the church.

> The basic plot is another chapter of The Da Vinci Code, but Ron Howard's direction is more even in this sequel of which the book was written as a prequel. Novel fans may be surprised to discover the

book's ending has been omitted; maybe as not to offend the Catholic Church.

Angles and Demons is a fastpaced thriller and a lavish production that bills intrigue about the Vatican City and Rome. It is somewhat violent and also complicated - not as much as The Da Vinci Code – so adults should leave younger children at home.

## 'Summer Hours' is pensive and poignant

nyone who has lost a parent will find a lot of deja vu in the French family drama Summer Hours, written and directed by Olivier Assayas. As matriarch Hélène ages, she loves it when her children and grandchildren come to their summer home where the youngsters run wild, the wine flows freely, and conservations range from current job

This summer Hélène (Edith Scob) is excited because her children have again returned to their home near Paris, this time to celebrate her 75th birthday.

Now living their collective lives around the world, it was not easy for them. Adrienne (Juliette Binoche, Dan In Real Life) is a designer based in New York. Her baby brother, Jérémie (Jérémie Renier), works for Puma shoes and has recently been transferred to China. Frédéric (Charles Berling) is an economist and university professor in Paris.

While the kids seem more intent on enjoying a celebration and family reunion, Hélène has another agenda for this get-together. She wants to talk about her death and what will happen to the family heirlooms which include several she inherited from her uncle's well-known and very valuable 19th century art collection.

Drawing Frédéric into the study, Hélène informs him what she plans to give to the museums, what he's in charge of, and what he should keep for himself. Frédéric's fidgeting clearly shows he's not ready for this conversation, but he obliges his mother by listening and nodding his head. He is most concerned about two paintings by Camille Corot, which he feels should always

remain in the family. While the adults discuss disbursements, the grand-children playfully roam the estate's creek beds and hillsides just as their parents once did

This is all beautifully photographed by Eric Gautier who captures the joy of life's fleeting moments as if ready for one of those new revolving image frames. In Into the Wild Gautier effectively

make Chris McCandless' life journey appear both vibrant and harrowing at the same time. He repeats that same magic in Summer Hours. One example is when Hélène is among her children and her eyes reflect admiration and pride of a job well done – yet when alone, her face becomes the bleak, emotionless mask of time run out.

The children finally depart, leaving Hélène to commiserate with her beloved Éloïse (Isabelle Sadoyan), who cooks and tidies up for her and probably knows her employer better than Hélène's own children. Within a year Hélène dies, and the children make their mournful journey home.

The siblings now face serious dilemmas. Adrienne and Jérémie don't see their families returning to Paris on a regular basis and want to sell the house. For Frédéric; it is like an heirloom, and he wishes to keep it for the family to reunite.

"My characters have no choice but to become adults,"

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Assayas said. "The previous generation has gone. They are not shielded from time or maturity anymore. In fact they're right in the firing line. They are no longer happy to just be in the present or to inventory the past. They ask themselves a new question: what they will leave behind."

In the midst of their decisions, each character uncovers family secrets that either derail or accelerate their wishes. For those who have not yet experienced these situations in their own life, it's most likely a time that will come in the future, and the film serves as a foodfor-thought precursor to those occasions.

While I found the ending terribly cliché and guilty of breaking the sentimental mood of the film, the great cast makes Summer Hours realistically pensive yet poignant.

Summer Hours is in French with English subtitles, and is playing at the San Diego Landmark Village Theater in La Jolla.

## 'Lost Boys of Sudan' to share stories from war-torn homeland

t was 1988 and young James Ariath was running for his life. Civil war had reached southern Sudan, where the Arab militia was systematically invading villages, slaughtering the Christian and non-Muslim population.

James was among the estimated 27,000 boys who were displaced and orphaned during the Second Sudanese Civil War, which started in the mid'80s and continued until 2005, when a peace accord was reached between the Islamic leadership and the Sudan People's Liberation Army, the former rebel force which had opposed the fundamentalist Sudanese government.

Young boys like James sur-

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vived by banding together on epic, perilous journeys across the border to international relief camps in Ethiopia and Kenya. Few girls made it to the settlements; those whose lives were spared were often raped and taken away as slaves or servants in northern Sudan.

"I ran and ran on my own to save my life and I found other boys who were also running," James wrote in an essay, part of a collection of writings produced by the Cuyamaca College Sudanese Cultural Club, formed in 2007 by a handful of "Lost Boys" whose English instructor, Marvelyn Bucky, is the group's adviser.

Five members of the club are putting on a presentation

from 1 to 3 p.m. Friday, May 22, in Rooms I-207 and 208 inside the Cuyamaca College Student Center. The event, "An Afternoon with the Lost Boys of Sudan: Stories of Survival and

Hope," is free and open to the public.

"We started walking over

1,000 miles, looking for a safe place to stay," James continues in his essay. "I was 10 years old and was considered an elder and put in charge of 250 boys, younger than me. I had them hold hands as we walked in a long line through tall grass,

forests and darkness, so they would not get lost. It was a nightmare. As we walked, we often heard gunfire, and daily, boys would die from dehy-

dration, starvation, and disease."

In 2000 and 2001, a b o u t 4,000 of the Lost Boys ar-

rived in the U.S. as refugees, settling in various cities with the help of humanitarian groups, relief agencies and churches. James arrived from a refugee camp in Kakuma, Kenya, where he had lived for eight years.

"I was fortunate to be sent to San Diego by the Alliance for African Assistance," James wrote. "Now there are 98 of us living in San Diego and we are all working full-time while we try to advance our level of education."

Dr. Cristina Chiriboga, college president, said the individual stories of the Lost Boys of Sudan are heart-wrenching, but the overall message the students seek to convey is one of hope and humanity.

"These remarkable young people are living proof of the strength of the human spirit, the will to survive," she said. "That they not only survived, but remain so positive about their futures is truly inspirational and uplifting. We are very proud that they have chosen Cuyamaca College as their path toward personal achievement. This is also a wonderful opportunity to share a cultural experience and to recognize the diversity of our student population.

These days, in addition to attending classes, James works as a slot technician at Barona Casino, and volunteers as a healthcare interpreter for the Alliance for African Assistance. A person of faith, James believes that it was because of God that he survived the treacherous escape from his homeland.

"Since faithful people have

helped me, God has made me feel that I must help others," he wrote.

Stories like James' compelled Bucky, despite her busy schedule, to help her current and former English students form the Sudanese Cultural Club and to assist with scholarship fund-raisers and events such as Friday's lecture.

"The mission of the club is to educate people about Sudanese culture and traditions, as well as provide a support group for the 'Lost Boys,'" Bucky said. "Many of them are alone in this country with no family; yet, they manage to be self-supporting and have this incredible spirit and hope to better their lives and to help others who are struggling."




