

The Olaf Wieghorst Museum's 7th Annu-al Western Heritage Days is set for June 6 and 7, along the 100 block of Rea Avenue in El Cajon. Admission is free. Wings Over Gillespie Air Show starts Friday

For aviation buffs, the Wings Over Gillespie Air Show is back! Scheduled for June 5, 6 and 7, Air Group One, of the San Diego wing of the Commemorative Air Force, will again present Wings Over Gillespie Air Show at Gillespie Field Airport, located at 1960 Joe Crosson Drive in El Cajon.

The Commemorative Air Force has the largest airworthy collection of former military aircraft in the world with over 150 flyable combat aircraft, making it the world's seventh largest air force. Each day will feature re-enactments of WWII and Vietnam War aerial battles complete with pyrotechnic displays, bombing runs, and strafing attacks. Stunt pilot John Collver will once again demonstrate his famous aerobatic skills in his SNJ "War Dog." Visitors will be able to get up close to famous combat aircraft from World War II and see classic warbirds and other interesting aircraft take to the sky! esource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County open house and ribbon cutting was held May 29 at the new facility, 11769 Waterhill Road in Lakeside. Marty Leavitt, District Manager and Elizabeth DeSourza, RCD President welcomed everyone to the new facility which is on the site of the old Riverview Water District offices. DeSourza advised the new place is a work in progress with draught resistant plants being planted, LED lights with dimmers installed and they are looking at solar power.

The Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County (RCD) announced on May 28 that it is receiving \$4,175,650 for 2009 to fund it's Fire Safe Council Support Program, no cost chipping service and D3 (dead, dying and diseased oak tree removal program) all of which will help prepare communities for wildfire. The US Forest Service (USFS) provides funding for all three programs.

The Mission of the Fire Safe Council of San Diego County is to provide education, exchange information and foster fire prevention and fire safety. The council was established in

1997. The Fire Safe Council of San Diego County is a regional support center for community fire safe councils throughout the county, which has helped form 84 community Fire Safe Councils, 64 are currently active.

What is a community Fire Safe Council?

- A community volunteer group concerned about local wildfire issues who work to save lives and property from wildfire.
- Community Fire Safe councils work on various wildfire projects including defensible space, chipping, community mapping, signage for fire crew access, public education and large scale fuel breaks.
- 80 Community Fire Safe councils spread throughout San Diego County
- · Majority located in unincorporated areas.
- Eligible to receive federal funding for wildfire mitigation program.

Since 1997, the Fire Safe Council of San Diego County's no-cost shipping service has provided vegetative protection to over 12,000 acres and has hosted numerous community chipping days.

Keynote speaker County

Chair Woman Dianne Jacob recognized the hard work of the RCDE and acknowledged the importance of the Fire Safe Council to the East County and its' Natural Resources.

Assemblyman Joel Anderson, 77th District Representative Collin McGlashen told the audience Assembluman Anderson has been a Director on the Fire Safe Council board for six years and is active in supporting natural resources. Senator Dennis Hollingsworth, 36th District Representative Ellen Malin said Senator Hollingsworth is working alongside RCD with state and local funding.

Much of the coordination required to prioritize and implement fuel reduction work across the county is accomplished through the Forest Area Safety Taskforce (FAST). FAST is an inter-agency collaborative tasked with coordinating wildfire mitigation strategy across jurisdiction. According to Cal Fire Unit Chief and FAST Facilitator, Howard Windsor "San Diego County has become recognized nationwide for Fast's innovative consensus driven approach to vegetation management."

The RCD of Greater San Diego administers all fire safe programs in partnership with the FSC of San Diego County. For further information go to www.firesafesdcounty.org.

For nine years one of the finest high school science teachers in our nation invites me in to a day of classes to present health from a blended perspective. That moment is always one of the finest of the year. Recall, doctor in Greek, the origin of the word, is equivalent to our English word teacher, not healer. However, this year took a sad turn. The fine teacher approached me with a cup of tea and tears in her eyes as she went over each class' seating roster. I could no longer easily apply eating strategies to better grades and achieving their dreams. Nope, it was another day in the office, in high gear and without their parents.

The student ability to concentrate and focus was at an all time low which led to a painfully slow pace for old speedy. It was difficult to begin when over half of each class did not know or remember what a chronic disease was. However, after a diagnosis was described and beginning diet interventions were given, lights started turning on. One young lady asked with such innocence why she never "got that stuff" when she "got her pill". Then she suddenly realized that she had just exposed herself but no one in the class responded rudely, they just smiled sadly. Needless to say, this pushin 60 year old dropped in his chair and immediately slept that night.

The foundation for those young people is still not in place and the girders are almost of adult height and demands. But, what do you expect when too many of their parents have told the earnest science teacher that that is how they eat and were taught. How about this strategy? Set up a required orientation each year for all freshmen parents and any others that are interested on our observations and a better approach. Your input would be invaluable. Stay tuned.

run into a lot of people at chamber functions and mixers as well as Rotary functions, etc. The main comment that I receive from people is "will a hypnotherapist make me do or say something I don't want to do?." For a lot of people their only exposure to hypnosis is from watching a movie depicting someone using hypnosis to control another or by watching a stage hypnosis show which is geared toward entertainment. Clinical hypnotherapy is not for entertainment, nor is it a power struggle to control someone's mind or actions. My concern is that people are not using this valuable resource because of their misconception about the field.

Clinical hypnotherapy was approved as a method in 1958 by the American Medical Association and is used by the Mayo Clinic, UCLA Pain Center, and medical schools such as Harvard and Stanford. Hypnotherapy offers one of the highest success rates for smoking cessation of 75 percent (my rate is 95 percent). Dateline NBC ran a series of using hypnotherapy for weight management, which indicated it was more successful than several other methods. Kaiser and Blue Shield endorse guided imagery for pre/post surgery to facilitate more rapid healing, reduce stress and have found that patients require less pain medication. The Journal of Cardiovascular Surgery concurs. Erectile Dysfunction was improved by 80 percent according to British Journal of Urology. The American Gastroenterological Association accepted hypnotherapy as a successful treatment of Irritable Bowel Sundrome in 1996. National Cancer Institute currently lists hypnotherapy as a method to manage cancer pain and studies have indicated that people involved in hypnotherapy support groups have better quality of life and survive longer. Insomnia patients reported improved sleep by 100 percent and 91 percent either eliminated or reduced sleeping medications. PMS symptoms are reduced by 57 percent per Obstetrics & Gyne-

Ford Super Duty 4x4 truck

'hy am I doing a road test on a big 4X4 gas guzzler? Well no matter what people might think, there are folks out there that need a big truck with four wheel drive capabilities - race car towing, horses, fifth wheel trailers, boats, etc. As far as gas guzzling goes, the F-250does not require posting their fuel mileage but when the math is done, it isn't all that bad. The price of gas or diesel is where the problem is. Has anyone noticed gas is back up close to \$3 per gallon and I'm sure diesel is even higher.

My truck came with the very powerful 6.4-liter V8 diesel backed by a 5-speed Torqshift Automatic transmission that shifted very smoothly and I liked having a temperature gauge for the transmission. Heat kills automatic transmissions! The truck had a stock lift that could pose a problem getting into the cab but thanks to well positioned grab handles it wasn't too bad getting behind the wheel (running boards are available, retractable or solid). Once behind the wheel the view is stunning, excellent gauge layout great center console, a well designed climate control system and a sound system to make the most avid music buff grin.

As for the 4X4 system, there is 'Shift-On-The-Fly,' which allows the driver to engage four wheel drive without stopping and engaging the transfer case. Back in the day the driver had to climb out of the truck and wade in ankle deep slug to engage the locking hubs. Not so with this beast. (Note: The diehard off roaders insist on manual locking hubs).

My test truck was a four door Super Duty, tons of room for big guys in the back seat and if no one is there the seats flip and fold for added inside storage space. Go outside and there are options for a few bed layouts, but when ordering a bed make sure to get the tailgate step and pole feature. Funny for as long as we have been building trucks Ford was the first one to incorporate a step and grab pole for easy access to the bed and if that is not enough, remember those metal bed extenders? We all thought that were the ticket until we had to load gear in the bed and that darn thing was always in the way, in fact most drivers removed them. Ford was listening and made the bed

extender collapsible so it can be stored in the side of the bed when not in use, pretty cool if you ask me.

The Super Duty comes in many styles and today the dealership is working unbelievable deals to get these work horses out on the open road.

Pricing on my test vehicle without any deep discounts was a base of \$39,200 and all said and done \$51,130 plus tax and license.





safely for residents, employees and customers. They are the basis for construction of buildings that provide protection against the devastation of natural disasters. They provide the standards of access for the disabled, the minimum standards for energy efficiency, and incorporate "green building" standards for future generations.

In cooperation with the de-

sign and construction industry, the Building and Fire Safety Division works to ensure the public's health, safety, and general well-being by reviewing building construction plans, issuing building permits, and inspecting buildings during and after construction to ensure that they comply with the minimum necessary health and safety regulations. This includes annual fire inspections of businesses, care facilities, and apartment complexes.

It's this preventative work that contributes to the success of keeping the occupants of the structure safe during an emergency. This is an ongoing effort to ensure that residents and individuals patronizing businesses in the City of El Cajon are afforded the highest construction standards available.

"It's important to create an awareness of the importance of building and fire codes. There are things that are easy to take for granted, until you need them," said Building Official and Fire Marshal Dan Pavao. "We have a motto, 'When I do my job right nothing happens.'

This means that no buildings collapse, fires are contained and people exit safely. It's not glamorous, but it's an essential part of the effort to keep our residents safe."

Annually we acknowledge this valuable service to our community through the observation of Building Safety Week during May. This observance emphasizes the important role the Building and Fire Safety Division plays in the development and maintenance of safe buildings in our community. The safety of the buildings we occupy daily is essential to the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of El Cajon. If



Summer dangers for pets ... ask a trainer

Dear Trainer:

s summer approaches pets spend more time outside with their families. Take time now to pet-proof your yard and look for hazards around the area to prevent interrupting your summer with an emergency. The following are the most common dangers for pets:

- Pools and pool covers—if you have a pool, be sure your dog knows where the stairs are so if he/she falls in they are able to get out. Pool covers can be dangerous for dogs as they often try to walk on them and then becoming trapped under the cover and unable to find their way out.
 - Stings from bees or wasps

can be minor or send your dog or cat into shock. Young puppies tend to get stung more often, so keep an eye on your pups as they play outside. Talk to your vet about what you should do before your dog or cat gets stung so you have a plan.

- Poisons such as rat or slug baits are always a concern this time of year. These are deadly and there is little time after ingestion to counter the effects. Be sure to keep all products like these out of the reach of your pets.
- Snakes—In Southern California, rattlesnakes are the big concern. There is a vaccine available, so check with your vet on that. Snake netting around the bottom of fences also helps to keep snakes
- out of the yard. Avoid the hype and the rattlesnake aversion classes, as these offer no guarantee that your dog won't be bitten, and are based on shock collar methods that are painful and often frightening to the dog. It's better to stick to clear paths when hiking, and supervising your dog in areas where you suspect there may be snakes. A product called Snake Away is available to help rid the yard of snakes: http://www.yardlover.com/ products. is one vendor that sells this product.
- Children—more children are bitten by dogs, (usually a family or known dog) during the summer months. This is attributed to more activity with children playing and visiting other homes during the summer months.

- Doors left open—this goes along with children being home and sometimes forgetting to close doors. The big hazard is getting hit by a car, so keep an eye on the doors, or better yet, teach your dog to wait at all doors until released.
- Chemicals on lawns and plants—Go organic if at all possible, and be sure to read all labels and follow directions, and instruct any yard care staff to inform you if they intend to use chemical on your lawn or garden.
- Poisonous plants and coco mulch—On the ASPCA's website is a list of plants that are dangerous to both dogs and cats, so be sure to visit there first if you are adding new plants to the yard. Also, avoid coco mulch as it has the same toxic effects as chocolate.
- Barbeques—some dogs will try to steal food from barbeques and can suffer burns from putting their paws on hot surfaces, or swallowing very hot food in an attempt to eat it quickly.
- Hot cars—this is just a reminder that it is illegal to leave a pet in a car on a hot day, not to mention life threatening. Even with the windows cracked, on a hot day, dogs or cats can quickly overheat and die since cars act like ovens and have been known to reach

temperatures upwards of 150 degrees in a very short time—even if it's not that hot outside. Animals left in that kind of heat will quickly perish.

- Hot pavement—since we wear shoes, we don't often think about how hot the sidewalk or pavement can be. Dogs have been known to burn and blister their feet from walking on hot surfaces such as asphalt.
- · Foxtails and burs-Not only are these annoying to try and get out of your dog's fur. foxtails, once imbedded in your pet's skin, can migrate and cause serious infections. Sneezing, and scratching at ears are common signs of foxtails in the ears and nose areas. Just because your dog stops sneezing, doesn't mean that he got the foxtail out. Foxtails are often found between the toes, so do inspect your dog's feet regularly, and especially if licking occurs.
- Fireworks—Excess numbers of dogs end up in shelters after the 4th of July because they bolt during the fireworks displays. If your dog is sensitive to these kinds of sounds, talk to your vet about medical treatment, or look into using natural treatments such as melatonin or other herb remedies. Don't leave your dog alone during fireworks if he/she has noise sensitivity.

• Sunburn-- the areas most prone to sunburn on dogs and cats are the nose, face and ear tips which can be covered with sunscreen made just for pets. These are available at most pet stores. Avoid getting these products in your pet's eyes. If you have a hairless pet or one with a thin coat, you will need to watch their exposure time, and be sure to always provide shade for your pets when they are left

- Heat Stroke—The signs of heat stroke include (but are not limited to): body temperatures of 104-110F degrees, excessive panting, dark or bright red tongue and gums, staggering, stupor, seizures, bloody diarrhea or vomiting, coma, and finally death. If you suspect heat stroke, get your dog to an emergency vet right away. Dogs with short-noses such as bulldogs or pugs and heavy-coated doos are more subject to heat strokes, but any dog or cat can suffer from this life-threatening problem.
- Antifreeze—can be a problem year round, but may be more prevalent during the hot months as cars overheat and it overflows from the radiator. This is a lime-green liquid and has a sweet taste to it and dogs or cats have been known to drink from puddles on the ground. Antifreeze is highly toxic and immediate action is needed to save the life of the animal that drank it.

These are the most common summer hazards for your pets, so keep your pets happy and healthy by planning ahead and avoiding these problems.

Be sure to have the ASPCA's Animal Poison Control Center phone number handy just in case your pet gets into something that may qualify as poison: 888-426-4435. They are open 24 hours a day and 365 days a year; however, there is a \$45 per case fee, payable by credit card. This fee includes as many follow-up calls as necessary in critical cases, and. on request, they will contact your veterinarian. Also, plan in advance where you will take your dog or cat if you face an emergency.
